GUELPH CENTRAL EXHIBITION.

BITION.

The fifth annual exhibition at Guelph, held this week, has been fully as successful in every respect as any of its predecessors, and in some instances more so. The weather, up to Thursday morning, was all that could be desired, except being rather dry and dusty. On Wednesday there was said to be over 10,000 visitors on the ground—they having been pouring in from early dawn by teams and trades from all directions. The total number of entries for competition considerably exceeded those of last year, having footed up to 5,317 on Saturday evening, and on Monday evening to nearly 6,000. Besides this there are a large number of articles on the ground for exhibition only, especially in musical instruments and machinery. The show of live stock is truly splendid—especially so in horses and cattle. Of the different classes of horses there are 339 entries; cattle 350; sheep 460; pigs 168; poultry 403; grain and seeds 290; hops 60; fruits, etc., 482; fruits 657; garden produce 243; plants and flowers 336; dairy produce 243; agricultural implements and tools 160; carriages, etc., 26; machinery, castings, etc., 46. Of ladies' work, 250; fine arts 200; domestic manufactures 90; paper, printing, etc., 19; natural history 29; metal work 60; woolen, cotton and flax goods 56—besides a great many other articles too numerous to mention. Taking a walk through the grounds on Wednesday, we noticed quite a number of animals and articles from this county and vicinity: Mr. Henry Mullen, of Esquerring, shows a very nice dark bay yearling colt, 15 hands high, said to weigh 990 lbs. Michael Lyons, of Haltonville, a three-year-old old blood filly; J. Brown, of Esquerring, has a handsome farm team, a bay filly and a brown gelding; David Galloway, Acton, a fine sorrel roadster; J. Tasker, of Milton, a black roadster team; W. Berger, of Milton, a road and carriage stallion and a pair of sorrel roadsters; D. Loney, Erin, a young black stallion; W. & J. Young, Erin, a six-year-old agricultural stallion; Donald McAvish, Nassagawaya, a roadster mare and a yearling stallion; James Fraser, Halton, a five-year-old saddle mare; R. Marshall, Georgetown, a five-year-old roadster; T. Clark, Georgetown, a handsome roadster; John Miller, Horby, a saddle horse, and an iron grey thoroughbred stallion; Roland Orr, Trafalgar, a pair black matched roadsters.
