Acton School Board. The regular monthly meeting of the School Trustees was held at the School House, on the 3rd inst. All the members were present.

Mr. Snyder moved, seconded by Mr. Snyder, that this Board carry out clauses 106 and 138 of the Ontario School Law, in reference to the attendance of children between the ages of seven and twelve years inclusive.

Mr. Smith moved, seconded by Mr. Hamilton, that the sum of \$30 be granted towards replenishing the Acton School Library, and that no works of fiction be purchased.—Carried.
