LOCAL MATTERS. -Heavy Ulster Overcoats made to order for \$8.00 at Dickson & McNab's. -Elder Scott of Toronto, will (D.V.) preach in the Disciple Meeting House in Acton next Lord's day at 11 o'clock a.m. also at 3.30 o'clock p.m.

-A log-cabin quilt comprising over 3000 pieces of calico has just been completed by Mrs. Joel Leslie, of the first line of Erin, near Acton. This is a remarkable instance of patience and perseverance combined with a laudable ambition to excel in beauty of design and correct taste. The quilt is represented to be an exceedingly handsome one. It will doubtless be exhibited at the next fall show.

High School Entrance Examination. An Examination of pupils for admission to the Oakville High School, will be held on Tuesday and Wednesday the 19th and 20th December next, beginning at 9 o'clock a.m. Candidates are requested to notify the headmaster, P. A. Switzer, Esq., not later than the 13th November, of their intention to present themselves for Examination, so that an estimate may be made of the number of papers to be printed.

Acton Shipments. That the business at the Acton Station is constantly on the increase may be inferred from the fact that the shipment of freight during the past month of October was nearly double that of the corresponding month of last year. Mr. Hunt, station-master, has kindly furnished us with the following figures: Amount of freight shipped during October, 2,305,085 lbs, or nearly 1403 tons net, the total charges being \$2,140. The total was made up principally of the following articles, a very good peas 156; apples 100; line 280; lumber 70; flour 30. In October, 1875, the total was 590 tons, with total charges \$1139. The largest sum charged on freight in any month on record was \$1292 in the month of June 1874, the bulk of it being for peas and lumber. The charges on incoming freight during the past month was also much larger than the corresponding month of last year, being \$246.11 against \$212.82. The number of passenger tickets sold in October, 1876, was 1513, representing a sum of \$194.45, against 631 tickets and \$351.18 in October 1875 - showing a very large increase.

Concert and Lecture. The entertainment under the auspices of the Acton Division Sons of Temperance in the Temperance Hall, on Tuesday evening, was both attended and well enjoyed. The choir was ably supported by Mr. D. D. Christie, and the proceedings commenced by an excellent performance by the brass band, followed by a song from the Division Choir. Mr. John Speight made a few appropriate remarks; a quartette comprising Messrs. A. Matthews, H. Gibbons and Misses C. Wilson and A. Cameron, sang a very beautiful song. Mr. E. Carwell, the celebrated temperance lecturer, was then introduced and made a remarkably effective address occupying more than an hour, the principal theme being on personal influence and the importance of exerting it in the proper manner and on all proper occasions. The lecture was interspersed with a number of amusing anecdotes illustrative of the power of personal influence over the ungodly drunkard. At the conclusion of the address, several songs were given in a delightful manner by several of our local amateurs. The Acton brass band did good service in making the entertainment enjoyable.

Acton School Board. The regular Monthly Meeting of the School Board was held in the school house last Monday evening, all the members being present. On motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by Mr. Snyder, the following accounts were ordered to be paid, viz: R. Zimmerman's of \$10.43 for building division fence between the head teacher's residence and adjoining premises; and Ann Hall's of \$8, for grading school grounds.

A communication was received from Mr. A. Grant preferring some complaints and intimating the desirability of a change of teachers. After hearing an explanation of the charges, the Board was unanimously of the opinion that the complaints were frivolous and without foundation. It was moved by Mr. Snyder, seconded by Mr. Leahy

that, after hearing Mr. Ross's explanation of the several charges preferred by Mr. Grant, the Board find them without foundation and discontinue the case. The chairman in a remark stated that he considered the conduct of parents in repeating the idle tales of their children without sufficient evidence of the facts, as injurious both to the teachers and the school, and recommended that in future parents should take the trouble to enquire of the teacher or when their children made complaints or repeated tales from the school.

On motion of Mr. Moore, seconded by Mr. Leahy, and carried unanimously, Mr. Ross was engaged for the ensuing year at a salary of \$350 and free residence. The re-engagement of the assistant teachers was deferred till next meeting of the Board, but the probability is that both Miss McKellar and Miss Moore will be re-engaged.

Mr. Ross presented his monthly report. The total number of children registered up to the 31st of October is 250. The attendance during the month being 33 departments during the month being respectively, 39, 31 and 48. In the second and third departments the attendance had been very irregular an account of the prevalence of whooping cough, but in the first department it had been better than any preceding month of the past half year. The average attendance for the half year ending 30th June was 139.44, or about 56 per cent. Mr. Ross continues: "I have also to report a very pleasing feature in connection with my departments, namely, that the pupils are more obedient and also more diligent in their studies than in any other month of this year. If parents would only second the teacher in his efforts in maintaining discipline in the school and insisting upon their children preparing their lessons at home, there would be few if any causes of complaint against the teacher. Several of my old pupils have returned to school, so that I anticipate a large school this winter, which I consider sufficient answer to those who say that the school is retrograding."
