Acton Council.—
The Council met last Thursday even-
ing, all the members being present ex-
cept the Reeve. Mr. Christie occupied
the chair. A by-law was passed for the
appointment of a returning officer, and
for the holding of the municipal elec-
tions, was introduced and passed. The
nominations are to be held in the Tem-
perance Hall on Friday, December 22d,
and the elections on Monday, January
1st.—John Ross to be Returning Off-
icer. Two or three small accounts were
passed, and the annual two dollar grant
to John McPhee. No other business
was transacted. Council adjourned till
next Thursday, 14th inst.

The regular monthly meeting of the
School Board was held last Monday
evening. Mr. Kennedy, chairman, re-
ported that in accordance with a reso-
lution of the previous meeting, he had
conferred with the teachers of the
Second and Third departments and had
re-engaged them for the ensuing year.—
Miss McKellar at a salary of \$275 and
Miss Moore at \$250, the latter being an
increase of \$25 over last year's salary.
On motion of Mr. Smith, seconded by
Mr. Moore, it was resolved to advertise
for a Caretaker for the ensuing year.
On motion of Mr. Snyder, seconded by
Mr. Moore, the Secretary was instruct-
ed to advertise for tenders for the sup-
ply of thirty cords of good hard wood
for the use of the school.—Mr. Smith
moved, seconded by Mr. Hall, that Mr.
Ed. Snyder be appointed to take the
school census for the year, and that he
be paid \$5.50 therefore. On motion,
the Board adjourned to meet again on the
18th instant, at half past seven p.m.

Eramosa Township Council.

This Council met at the Centre
Inn, on the 1st inst. All the mem-
bers (with the exception of Mr.
Carter), present, the Reeve in the
chair. The minutes of last meeting
were read and confirmed. Ten
dollars were ordered to be paid to
John Moore and \$13.50 to Wm.
McCullough for services taken from
their pits. Ten dollars were granted
to John Howson, \$10 to Thos.
Balton, \$10 to Mrs. Kavanagh, \$5
to John Carter for the benefit of
Mrs. Burton, \$5 to Margaret
Thomson and \$4 to Peter Black,
indigent persons.

It was moved and seconded, that
no action be taken in the matter of
claims by the friends of Mr. Mann.
Ten dollars were ordered to be paid
to Mrs. Lamb for the use of the
Council room during the cur-
rent year, and \$10 to the trustees
of the Rockwood town hall for the
use thereof for Division Court busi-
ness.

By-laws appointing places for
holding the nomination and elec-
tion of Reeve, Deputy Reeve and
Councillors to serve during the
year 1877, were introduced and
passed after the usual number of
readings.

Sixteen dollars were ordered to
be paid to the Clerk for regis-
tration of births, marriages and deaths,
and \$8 for blanks and stationery
for the use of his office; \$20 were
ordered to be paid to the Treasurer
for extra services; \$5 were ordered
to be refused to Matthew
Dorion, he not having had his li-
cence the whole year; \$10 were
ordered to be paid to each member
of the Council for superintending
the improvements on the roads
during the current year.

The Reeve, on motion, having
left the chair, it was taken by the
Deputy Reeve, when it was moved
and duly seconded, that the thanks
of this Council be tendered to John
Reeves, Esq., for the able and impar-
tial manner in which he has pre-
sided over the meetings of this
Council during the current year.

The Council then adjourned
to the 18th instant, at half past seven p.m.
