A few days afterwards a meeting of Mr. Roy's congregation was held for the purpose of organizing a new church. A document was read adopting the Congregational form of government. The terms of admission into the Church are :-- A simple requirement that applicant desired to flee from the wrath to come, and felt a desire to work out the conviction of a new faith. was moved and carried that the name of the new charch be the Wesley Congregational Church.
