Ena Township Council.

The Council met at the Township Hall, Ena Village, June 29th, the rovee in the chair, all the members present.

Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Barbour, the application was dismissed.

Moved by Mr. Pearson, seconded by Mr. Reid, that Neil McPhail be paid \$4.90 for gravel furnished two Road divisions, and Joseph Maud, \$4c for gravel for one Division.

Carried. Mr. Barbour moved, Mr. McMillan seconded, that the clerk be instructed to notify parties complained of by Daniel Moxley to remove their fences and all other obstructions off the Highway opposite their lots on the 8th line, giving the full width of the road.

Moved by Mr. Barbour, seconded by Mr. Pearson that Mr. Reid be instructed to examine the bill of which Mr. Mooney gives such a bad report, and let the job of graveling—Carried.

On motion by Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. Barbour, the Court of Revision was opened for the purpose of hearing appeals. The assessment roll was again carefully examined there being no appeals, and on motion by Mr. Pearson, seconded by Mr. Reid, the Court closed, and the assessment roll was received as revised.

The Council then resumed business. Wm. R. Chisholm presented a bill of \$24 for keeping traps last April.

Mr. McMillan moved, seconded by Mr. Pearson, that the Revoe order payment. Carried.

On motion by Mr. Reid, seconded by Mr. McMillan, the Revoe order payment of \$2.50 to Geo. Beer, for plank furnished for a culvert in his road division. The bill presented by Charles McMillan, 75 cents for clerical for a road survey, was on motion by Mr. McMillan, seconded by Mr. Reid, paid.

Moved by Mr. Barbour, seconded by Mr. Pearson, that the petition of John McEwen and others, asking \$22.00 as a grant to supplement a like sum granted by the Council to improve the town line between Caledon and Ena, seconded by Mr. Reid, that \$30.00 be granted by this Council, which with \$50.00 granted by the County Council, shall go to supplement the sum granted by the County Council of Halton for the improvement of the hill on the town line, known as Swackhamer's hill—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Barbour, seconded by Mr. Reid, that the Council adjourn till 20th, at Kirk's Hall, Hillsburg.
