NEARLY KILLED.—John Hyde, Steward at the Guelph general hospital, had a narrow escape from being murdered during Friday night. He was watching James Smith, a violent lunatic who is being treated at the hospital. Smith suddenly rose from his bed, and seizing an article of chamber furniture, made a murderous attack on Mr. Hyde, cutting him severely about the neck and breast. A severe and prolonged struggle ensued, Hyde being weakened by the loss of blood, and the lunatic being endowed with the strength of madness, the steward was nearly overpowered, and well-nigh murdered. When assistance arrived, it required the united strength of the doctor and four men to restrain the lunatic's violence.

DROPPED DEAD.—Malcolm Curry, of lot 34, in the Gore of Puslinch, went to church on Sunday, came home and was engaged in unitching his horse, when he dropped dead. He was nearly 80 years of age, and was much respected by his neighbors. He was one of the early pioneers in his section, and leaves a highly respected family.
