

by the giving of prizes; VI, absence of undue emotional excitement, and its effect on the pupil's power of study; VII, objects to be studied should be actually presented to the pupils—this is much better than only explaining. These points were all thoroughly discussed, and the lecture was a very profitable one.

Prof. Young was tendered a vote of thanks for his lecture, after which the Association adjourned at eight.

A large number of people congregated in the Town Hall, when Dr. J. A. McLellan, M. A., of Toronto, delivered an excellent lecture, on the subject, "This Canada of Ours." The audience was greatly surprised at the importance of this Canada, and the lecturer succeeded in impressing numerous ideas on their minds.

March 1st, 1879. After the opening exercises the President intimated that Mr. Barber, proprietor of the paper mill, had kindly intimated that the teachers might inspect the paper mill, which invitation was accepted.

A committee of Messrs. Little, of Acton, McLean, of Milton, Coates, of Norval, and Moore, of Georgetown, were appointed to select books for a library, which is to be kept at the Model School, Milton. The library open only to members of the Association.

The Association tendered votes of thanks to the following: Trustees for the use of the school; Town Councillors for the use of the hall; People of Georgetown for their hospitality to the teachers, and the billposting committee for their labor.

It was then decided that the next meeting of the Association should be held in Burlington, the time to be decided by the President and Secretary.

The following officers were elected for the ensuing year: Pres., R. Little, re-elected; Vice Pres., Dr. Lusk; Sec'y., R. Coates, re-elected; Managing Committee, H. H. Moore, Cameron, Malcolm and McKay.

Mr. Switzer, of Elora, being in delicate health was unable to discuss the subject of Algebra as assigned him in the programme, but Dr. McLellan took up the subject, and gave the teachers who are endeavoring to advance some ideas which would be useful to them.

He showed by examples on the board, how to reduce algebraic forces, clearly explaining each point. The lecture was very good, and many of the teachers stored in their minds the hints thrown out, which will, without doubt be of service.

This closed the business of the Association, and the President declared the proceedings at an end.

In the afternoon a large number of the teachers visited the paper mill, where they were shown the different operations by which paper is made.
