(Reported for the Free Press.)

The annual meeting of the Sabbath School Association of the County of Halton was at Burlington in the Presbyterian Church, on Thursday and Friday, February 13th and 14th, 1878.

The President, John Barclay, Esq., Superintendent of the Presbyterian Sabbath School, Oakville, is in the chair.

The opening exercises were conducted by Rev. S. W. Fisher, pastor of the church.

On account of the unavoidable absence of the Secretary, R. W. Vellick, Esq., was appointed Secretary pro tem.

On motion of John Walde, Esq., the following gentlemen were named as a business committee—William Atkinson, Rev. J. Hilton, J. Walde, J. Headland, J. M. Cockburn, W. Bunting and Wm. Freeman.

The Rev. S. W. Fisher and Mr. McKay, Esq., were appointed a committee on Recitations.

Verbal reports were received from eleven schools: Rev. G. Abbott reported the schools on his field of labor, Pine Grove selected by D. Allen, Esq.; Victoria selected by J. Husband, Esq.; Appleby schools, Tuck's and Burlington schools.

W. J. McCall, of St. Catharines, conducted the devotional exercise at the opening of the afternoon session. The business committee reported a congenial programme; that Rev. J. Hilton take the place of the Rev. Dr. Brownell, who was absent. Verbal report resumed for a short time. The Presbyterian school of Oakville and Canada Methodist school of the same place were reported by their respective Superintendents.

The first question was, How shall we interest the elder scholars so as to retain them in our schools? It was introduced by Rev. G. Abbott, of Peterborough.

As your reporter heard only a very small part of the rev. gentleman's address, he cannot attempt to give your readers anything to correct or fill up the account of the plan to be followed to secure the desired end. One sentence, however, is well worthy of note, and should be practised by every Sabbath School worker who has intelligent pupils in his school, and that is, Interest them by giving them something to do. After the discussion of this important question the Secretary's report was called for; upon which he read the following report.

Mr. President, I submit the following statistical report: I sent to every school I could find a sheet containing a number of questions to be filled up and the sheet or report of the school was in many cases referred to me in time to prepare for the meeting.

Twenty-two schools complied with my request. Two of the schools are Union, twenty are Presbyterian, two are Methodist, one Episcopalian and the remaining twelve are Canada Methodists. There are 201 teachers, 1833 scholars, 93 officers. This is an average of one teacher to every nine scholars, and twenty pupils for every officer.

Every school, save one, reports a library. There are 5311 volumes in the various schools, or about three volumes to each pupil. Thirty-two admissions into the churches were reported, this being for every two schools or 16 per cent of the scholars in the schools or about 15 per cent of the pupils.

The amount reported to have been raised for missions is \$82.87 or 3 cents for each teacher, officers and scholars. The expenses for keeping the schools in all necessary supplies, is \$572.21, or \$26.01 per school, or 301 cents per scholar.

Twenty-one of the schools have Uniform Lessons and one did not report on this point. Twelve schools have quarterly reviews, two of these have monthly, and two more have weekly reviews. These have weekly reviews only, two have monthly reviews only, while one school reviews, very extensively, weekly, monthly and quarterly. Four schools use blackboards, and three use maps. In ten schools there are meetings for the study of Catechisms or Moral Science.

Five schools complain of irregularity of teachers and pupils. One says the scholars get "too fat." Others say lack of earnestness on the part of the teachers, others say it is difficult to get good teachers. One word for the scholars—If teachers are ignorant, then surely the scholars will not be. The world owes to the Sabbath School sons of the sweetest, the brightest, the most delightful music in existence.
