

...tions must point in the same direction, if you are to be successful in your work. (3) He should be a "successful person." The work of a teacher is not a "natural" work, and he must be "come spiritually minded in order to do it right." In fact he cannot know that which is spiritual unless he becomes spiritual. "The natural man receiveth not the things of the spirit of God, for they are foolishness unto him; neither can he know them, because they are spiritually discerned." And (4) a S. S. teacher should be characterized by certain qualities. Without this qualification he cannot do the work, as the importance of the work demands. This is a rule by which all Christian workers should be governed.

The second question is—"How far is a S. S. teacher responsible for the success of the work?" The answer to this question must depend upon what we understand by success in S. S. work. There are different degrees of success in this work. If you say that it is the work of a S. S. teacher to collect or gather in a class of children from the streets, and then teach them the word of God in a Sabbath School, if he succeeds in gathering them in, and if his presentations of the truths of the Bible succeeds in keeping up an unquiescent interest in the class; I would say he was a successful teacher, and for such a teacher he is largely responsible. But if you mean success in the highest degree, in the salvation of the soul, if you say that a S. S. teacher is responsible only for the best possible use of the divinely appointed means. If he uses the divinely appointed means, (which I have referred to in the best possible way, with the certainty God has given him, whether he succeeds in leading the soul to Christ or not, he has done his duty and responsibility ceases with the performance of duty. And that shall treat my words unto them, whether they will hear or whether they will forsake."
