Board of Education.

Board of Trustees of Acton School Division met in the school house last Tuesday evening, 3rd inst., at 8 o'clock. Present, Messrs. W. H. Storey in the chair, D. Henderson, S. Moore, M. Speight and Alex. Leary.

Resolved that whereas this School Board has been deprived of one of its most active members in consequence of sickness and lamented death of the late Edward Moore, Esq.

And whereas we are desirous of expressing our deep regret, and placing on record our high estimate of his value as an honourable, upright and worthy citizen and a friend of Education.

Therefore it is moved by D. Henderson and seconded by Alex. Leary, that the chairman of this Board be authorized on behalf of the Board to present this motion of condolence to Mrs. Moore and family in expression of our deep sympathy with them in their affliction.

The Finance Committee recommended payment of the following accounts: T. Moore, May salary \$41.66. Miss McElroy, do. 25.00. Miss Moore, do. 22.92. Mr. Hughes, Carpenter 6.25. Mr. Speight, for paying the difference account for repairs to teacher's residence 57.20. On motion the report was adopted. The Board then adjourned to meet Sunday evening, 7th July.

Acton Village Council.

Council met Monday evening, as a Court of Revision, pursuant to adjournment. Members present were D. Christie, reeve, D. Henderson, C. S. Smith and R. Adams. After having subscribed to the statutory oaths, the reeve was appointed chairman of the Court. The Revision Court was then adjourned until the 16th instant, and the time for making appeals was extended five days. Court closed and council resumed. Last meeting's minutes were confirmed. The grant of \$3.00 per month to John McFee will be continued during May, June, July and August. The following accounts were recommended by the Finance Committee, to be paid: F. A. & H. P. Morris, advertising, \$3, 12. - W. Lundy, \$5, 26.7 - W. Massey, \$2, 50. - G. Pinkney, \$1, 20. - J. B. Burns, \$2, 00. - W. Insomond, \$7, 50. - T. McLennan, \$6, 00. - G. Warden, \$3, 50, total \$89, 96. The report was adopted. The Street and Sidewalk Committee recommended that a culvert be made on Frederick street and one on Queen street. Report was adopted. The special graves and committee submitted the following report:

"A special committee appointed to make a survey of a suitable place for a cemetery, to report that there was required several parcels of land that could be obtained for the purpose, and with a view to obtaining the opinion of the people in the matter, before doing anything further would recommend that the reeve call a public meeting of the ratepayers to be held next week, to obtain an expression of opinion." C. S. Smith, Chairman.

The report was adopted. Council adjourned to meet again on the 16th instant.

Naisnawya Council.

Council met on Monday, 25th ult., pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. The meetings minutes were confirmed. The council adjourned and the different members having subscribed to the statutory oaths, organized a Court of Revision. The reeve was appointed chairman and the court carefully examined, and the following amounts were made: - Alex. Hayes, tenant instead of Martin; Mrs. Moore, instead of W. H. Storey; Timbers name was struck off; Mr. Henderson and S. Barber were made to pay for dog; G. & J. Horner were not entered as farmers' sons, not having sufficient information. The assessment roll was adopted as amended. Court adjourned. The "By-law" determining what shall compose a lawful fence, and for restraining the running at large of certain animals was read a first time and laid over for future consideration. Mr. Holmes was appointed administrator of the 14th Division, in place of Dr. Morrison, who resigned. Some for the dead killed in the fire paid as follows: - W. Burns, \$8. for sheep; G. McMillan, \$4. 27. for 1 sheep; F. Little, \$0. 66. for 3 sheep. H. Gingle,

was appointed caretaker of hall, at a salary of \$24, one-half to be paid by the Sons of Temperance.

The Committee on Roads and Bridges in the western half presented their report, which recommended improvements to be made at the following places, viz.: lot 30, 2d line, repairing and graveling a portion of roadway, say 20 rods; a few dollars to be expended opposite lot 21, on the same line, to make the road at present travelled passable until such time as a sufficient amount can be granted to make the road through the town on the proper place; also side roads between lots 10 & 11, 6th line, 4th and 5th lines, graveling and digging ditches; also opposite lot 20, 4th line, filling and grading 12 rods of rock, graveling and opening ditches across a swamp; also opposite lots 30, 31, 32, 6th line, about 150 rods to open about equal parts of swamp and rock; for winter travel; also opposite lot 10, 2nd line, repairing a bridge and straightening the road through the swamp.

The Committee in the Easterly half, recommended improvements to be made at the following places, viz.: opening a Town line between Nassagawa and Pauline, completely; also opening the road from lots 5 to 11, 6th line, also opening the road from lots 11 to 15, 7th line; also opening the Town line between Nassagawa and West Flamborough, opposite lots 2 and 3, of the former, jointly; also opening and fixing the road opposite lots 4 & 5, of the latter, also fixing bridges, and straightening the road opposite Alex. Stearns; also sign between lots 15 and 16, 4th line, and fixing the Church Hill, 4th line; also repairing the mountain opposite lots 1 and 7, 7th line. On motion the council adjourned to meet again at the call of the reeve.
