Acton Village Council. Council met Monday evening, as a Court of Revision, pursuant to adjournment. Members present were D. D. Christie, reeve, D. Henderson, C. S. Smith and R. Adams.

Four special committees appointed to make enquiry as to a suitable place for a cemetery here to report that they have examined several parcels of land that could be obtained for the purpose, and with a view to obtaining the opinion of the people on the matter, before doing anything further would call a public meeting of the ratepayers, to be held next week, to obtain an expression of opinion.

Nassagaweya Council. Council met on Monday, 26th ult., pursuant to adjournment. All the members present, the reeve in the chair. Last meeting's minutes were confirmed.

The Committee on Roads and Bridges, in the weekly meeting, their report, which recommended improvements to be made at the following places, viz: a portion of the highway, near 20 rods, a few dollars to be expended opposite lot 21, on the same line, to make the road at present travelled passable until such time as a sufficient amount can be granted to make the road through the pond, on the opposite side of the line opposite Mr. Barry's, between lots 20 and 21, 4th con., grading and opening ditches; also opposite lot 20, 7th line, filling and grading 12 rods of rock, graveling and opening ditches across a swamp; also opposite lot 30, 2d, 3d, 4th line, about 180 rods to open—about equal parts of swamp and rock—for water (travel); also opposite lot 10, 2d line, repairing a bridge and straightening the road through the swamp.

The Committee in the Eastern half, recommended improvements to be made at the following places, viz: opening a Town line between Nassagaweya and Paxton; also opening the road from lot 2 to 11, 6th line; also opening the road from lot 11 to 15, 7th line; also repairing the Town line between Nassagaweya and West Flamboro; also opening the road between the road opposite lot 2 and 3, of the former, conjointly, also straightening and fixing the road opposite lot 2 and 3, in the second and third concessions; also fixing bridges, and straightening the road opposite Alex. Smead's; also opening between lots 15 and 16, 3rd con., and fixing the Church Hill 4th con., repairing the mountain opposite lot 2 and 3, 7th line, in motion the council adjourned to meet again at the call of the Reeve.

Erin Council. Council met on 31st May, pursuant to adjournment. All the members were present. The meeting's minutes were confirmed.
