**Yellow Fever.**  
The welcome news comes from Memphis that the yellow fever is dead; the Howard Association has discharged all nurses and closed its offices. Frost has set in and Yellow Jack has gone to sleep for the winter. Merchants are opening up their stores, and the cotton trade is reviving. The cotton crop of Tennessee this year is large, and its sale will measurably restore the late prestige of Memphis, which is the greatest cotton market in the south west.

**Gold for Bread.**  
A million and a half of gold arrived in New York from Europe last week. This is the way and quantity in which the precious metal is gradually flowing from Europe to this continent of exhausted resources. With the present conditions of prosperity continued it is not difficult to foresee the time when every encouragement now held by European capital on the industries of this country will be removed, when the profits of production will not go to paying interest on debt, but will be distributed between domestic capital and labor. There is unquestionably a better time ahead for North America.

**Avoid Unnecessary Anxiety.**  
Hardly a week passes within which there is not the announcement of the sudden death of some prominent man, which is attributed to business troubles, to depression and anxiety, or to overwork.  
An all important practical lesson should be deduced from these numerous sad and untimely deaths. They result from unnecessary anxiety pressing upon both mind and body. We say unnecessary anxiety, because it might be avoided by care beforehand. Much of the business trouble which racks and tortures so many men could easily be shunned by better managed plans of business. It arises from habitually rushing ahead without reflection where one is coming out. One day of thought and five of work is much better than six days of work and one day of reflection beforehand would often save many long and dreary days of sorrow afterward.  
Think before you enter upon any new plan, of all the chances of mishap, and how to make success certain. No chances of profit compensate for the heavy load of care which may be a prominent man carries and tries to conceal from other eyes.  
If you would live long, if you would enjoy anything of life's sunshine and flowers of life, think beforehand and avoid as far as possible all sources of unnecessary anxiety.

**Lunatic Fringe or Banged Hair.**  
That many of the prevalent fashions are extremely unbecoming it is well known to mention. Everybody knows this except the women who adopt them. They may know it, too, but they are so set on fashion that some of them would rather be thought fashionable than good looking. Of all the positively unbecoming modes now current, the mode of wearing the hair "banged," or combed down over the brow, is perhaps the ugliest. It is the least original, it is the most imitative, it is copied in New York, and was first initiated here. It clearly betrays its origin, and is worthy thereof, for it gives to any woman a bold look, such as comports with the character of its originator. Banged hair is particularly affected by burlesque and variety actresses, who emphasize their appearance unpleasantly thereby, and who may be no ignorant of the laws of taste as to believe it adds to their homeliness. There never has been a human creature who was not deteriorated by this odious style of wearing the hair, unless, perhaps, a person of preceding forehead. In such case, as the defect in the brow is partially hidden, banging may be recommended. But very few women, we imagine, who long their hair could be persuaded that their facial outline denotes weakness of intellect, although the latter certainly does.  
Banging entirely destroys the effect of a fine forehead, and lends to the whole face a degree of insipidness, which hardly any banger would incur, if she could realize its full force. It is surprising how many women, very nice women some of them, bang their hair in this and other places. They do it without reflection, without any other thought than that it is fashionable. Women of really good faces, who have individuality and ideas of their own, do not bang.

**Fatal Accident.**  
On Monday last an accident occurred between Biceps and Milton which resulted in the death of William Stewart of the former place. It appears that the deceased and James Robinson had been to Milton on business and when returning home, deceased got out of the wagon for something and trying to regain his seat in the wagon while it was in motion, he fell backwards and it is supposed the wheel passed over him. At the time he did not appear to be badly injured, but immediately got into the wagon, and rode home. 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
