INTERMEDIATE EXAMINATIONS.—The

Minister of Education has revised the regu-

lations affecting intermediate examinations.

If a candidate in future obtains only 30 per

cent. of the marks on each subject, and 40 per

cent. on the group, he or she will be enti-

tled to a non-professional third class

teacher's certificate; if 50 per cent. of the

whole number be obtained a second class

certificate will be granted; while 40 per cent. on each

subject, 40 per cent. on each group, and 60 per

cent. of the whole will entitle the candi-

date to a second class grade A certificate.
