IRISH RELIEF.
 A VERY sensible suggestion comes from London by cable to the effect that the money sent by Canada for Irish Relief would have been more beneficial had it been spent in procuring farms for, and aiding, emigrants. The remark comes a little late, but it is still some efforts being made to obtain funds, by various means, for Irish relief; it would be well for those noble souls, who love to help their fellow creatures, to consider the proposition. Certainly we need emigrants to till our prairie land, and to clear our forests, and Ireland has thousands of stalwart, hale and hearty men and women to spare. They are starving now, and it were far better philanthropy to send them an ocean passage ticket, and help them to help themselves in this new land of plenty, than to send a few bags of meal or potatoes, to merely tide them over their present distress.

Sensible Advice.
 Under the heading "Don't Come," the Winnipeg Times gives advice to young men looking for safe jobs, not to seek them in Manitoba. There are no sinners there now, it says. There have been thousands of instances that could be cited of young men who have become disgraced and disheartened by disappointment, and to all who have not capital or means of settling on the land, the Times says "don't come." There is a whole volume of wisdom to be learned in this brief declaration, and parents of boys, who are just entering upon manhood, should ponder well upon it. Education has become so general, that young men capable of performing office work, and clerkships of all kinds, are far in excess of the demand. The learned professions, too, are becoming crowded beyond the requirements of the population. In view of these undoubted facts, parents who are seeking a career for their boys, should not be content with merely giving them what passes in those days for an education, and leave them to fight for a livelihood as clerks and office boys. It is a very natural desire to have an easy, gentlemanly way of living, but character and independence are of higher moment. If we glance over the country, we will find that agriculture, stock raising, and kindred pursuits, need careful skill, and willingness to face hard work are the things that offer the best openings for the energy of our young men, and contain the greatest promise of success. Those who train their boys to meet the national wants in these respects, will have the gratification of seeing them grow with the progress of the country in wealth and influence, while those who preferred less useful and more easy paths, will be left far behind in the race of life.

The Donnelly Murder.
 Reward Offered by the Ontario Government.
 The Ontario Government has issued a proclamation offering a reward of four thousand dollars in the Donnelly murder case. Every effort should be made to trace out the perpetrators of the cowardly crime and convict them. Evidence convincing enough has produced before the public to cause them to live off any soil shall be offered upon the scaffold, but when that evidence is once secured, and there is no reasonable doubt as to the murderer, the safety of the people demands that the full penalty of the law shall be inflicted. It is to be hoped that no effort will be spared on any hand to bring the guilty parties to justice.

 A meeting of the Board of Directors of the Equipping Agricultural Society was held in Sierawtown, on 13th March. This President in the chair. Present—James Marshall, Vice President; all the Directors, and the following Honorary Directors: Messrs. W. C. Lee, J. O. Barber, Wm. Wilson, John T. Elliot, and James Murray.
 Moved by D. Reid, Esq., seconded by John Evans, Esq., that the annual show of this Society for the year 1880, be held at the Village of Georgetown, the mover and Mr. Barber guaranteeing the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars.
 Moved in amendment by Capt. Shaw, seconded by Geo. Tolton, Esq., that the annual show of this Society for the year 1880, be held at the Village of Acton, the mover and second guaranteeing the sum of one hundred and twenty dollars, and the necessary accommodation free of expense in addition.
 The original motion was then declared carried.
 Moved by James Marshall, Esq., seconded by C. S. Mackenzie, that the membership of this Society be confined to actual residents of the Township. Carried.
 It was also on motion, resolved, that all persons paying their annual subscriptions on and after the 15th day of July next be required to pay fifty cents extra to entitle them to Membership. Carried.
 The meeting then adjourned.

Guolph Easter Fair and Fat Cattle Show.
 On Wednesday last the cattle and sheep competing at the live stock show were taken to the Market Square, Guolph, to be judged. The Judges were Thomas Featherston and Thomas Crawford, Toronto, and W. Williamson, Brampton. This show on the whole was very good, though in some respects it did not equal that of former years, another fact, due to the best animals being bought up for shipment. Mr. P. O'Rourke, of Shek-spear, had the best show of cattle, exhibiting a number of animals purchased from George Moore, of Waterloo. They were of the Durkum grade class, and the quality was pronounced very fine. The oxen exhibited in this class were also good, but not equal in quality to that seen at many Easter shows here. In the aged cow class, some very fine animals of the Durkum fed were shown, and there was a close contest between Messrs. Some and McQueen for first place. The heifers in the two and the three year old class were also good. Henslock Young taking the lead. The half bred Hereford calf exhibited by J. & R. Miller, was perfect of its kind, and was from the Model Farm stock. A calf from the same cow, one by the same bull, was the best calf in Canada a year ago, and sold in Montreal for \$50. The sheep exhibit compared very favorably with that of previous years. The sheep shown by Mr. Hood carried off all the best prizes, and claims the animals cannot be beaten on the continent. —Mercury.
