Russian Famine.

While all the world is sending relief to the famine stricken people in Ireland, another grievous famine is raging in another quarter. The Russian consul at Van, Armenia, telegraphs, appealing for aid to save the inhabitants of that district from utter destitution. The famine is said to be increasing, and hundreds are dying of starvation, one hundred and fifty having already succumbed at Akhik, and one hundred at Van. The Russian authorities at Rostoff are forwarding food to the sufferers, but are unable alone to cope with the distress, and unless other help is sent immediately, whole villages will be almost entirely depopulated.

THE BRITISH ELECTIONS.

LATEST returns give the English Liberals 315 seats; Conservatives, 228; Home Rulers, 51. Giving the Home Rulers to the Conservatives the Liberals have now a majority of 69, which may be slightly increased before the elections are all concluded, there being thirty-six constituencies yet to hear from. Efforts are being made to induce Mr. Gladstone to accept the Premiership, the London Times remarking that it will be impossible to constitute a thoroughly stable Ministry if Mr. Gladstone remains out of it. The Liberals of the Metropolis are organizing an expedition to greet Mr. Gladstone on his return from Scotland, and the Irish associations in London are preparing a public reception to Mr. Parnell, who has been prevented with the freedom of the City of Cork in recognition of his services to Ireland.

Canadian Stock-Raising.

The farmers of Canada are beginning to realize that in the future their chief source of profit will be the raising of stock for the English market. The western States will supply wheat, but Canada may fairly expect to enter keenly into competition in the cattle trade. Knowing this, it must be a matter of great interest to farmers that they should have a good breed of stock, and we notice they are becoming alive to its great importance. A lot of short-horn grade were lately purchased at Guelph for six cents a pound as they stood; while ordinary stock sold at Toronto for half price. Thoroughbred sires are at present in demand, and the demand will increase, for it is not only cattle breeders who require them, but the dairymen of Ontario are beginning to realize that good sires will produce good stock, and as a consequence, milk, cheese and butter.

New Coroners' Inquests Act.

The duty of coroners under the Act passed at the late session of the Ontario Legislature is set forth in a letter from Mr. F. Fenton, County Coroner of York. Mr. Fenton points out that under the old Act an inquest could not be held unless it appeared to the coroner that the deceased died from violence or unfair means, or by culpable or negligent conduct either of himself or of others under such circumstances as require investigation, and not through mere accident or mischance. Under the new Act the coroner cannot refuse to hold an inquest held on the issue of his warrant for holding the inquest he makes a declaration in writing under oath, stating that from information received by him he is of opinion that there is no reason for believing that the deceased did not come to his death from natural causes or from mere accident or mischance, but came to his death from violence or unfair means of culpable or negligent conduct of others under circumstances requiring investigation by a coroner's inquest. The Act further provides that this section is not to apply to an inquest held on the written request of the County Coroner's Attorney, nor to inquests on prisoners dying in jail. As a matter of fact the new Act requires nothing more from the coroner than that he shall issue a warrant that he entertains the opinion that an inquest is necessary.

It is now asserted on what may be called good authority, that the crisis, as it regards the Irish famine, has already been reached.

Horrible Accident.

A Man's Head Cut Off by a Circular Saw.

On Friday a terrible accident occurred at the saw mill of Peter Fairbrother, near Kingston, where John Lee, of Port Hope, was completely decapitated and one of his arms cut off. Lee, who was foreman of the mill, was engaged in fixing the guide of one of the circular saws, when by some means he fell against it, and it being running at full speed his neck on touching the teeth was gradually drawn along, and before the saw could be stopped the poor fellow's head was severed. It fell on one side of the bench, filling the present with horror. Before his head one of Lee's arms was cut off from the shoulder. Of course death was instantaneous.

Nassagaweya Items.

From our own correspondent.

The heavy rain of last week had the effect of settling the bad roads and they are now in a much better condition.

Mr. James Logie, of Nassagaweya, who has been attending Georgetown College during the winter months, has returned home, where he will probably spend the summer.

Sugar making here has not been very profitable this year as the run of sap has been small, however, the quality of the sap gathered is much superior to that generally produced.

The Scott Act.

In the Supreme Court at Ottawa, on Tuesday, the case of the city of Fredericton v. the Queen, involving the question of the constitutionality of the Scott Act, judgment was given by Chief Justice Ritchie, and Justice Fontaine, Taschereau, and Gwynne deciding in favor of the Act.

Canadian News.

Refugee Blakeie has decided to have the Hanlan Courthouse by way of road on the Potomac, above Washington.

A Canadian emigrant train bound for Winnipeg, near West Union, on the St. Paul and Winnipeg railroad, was wrecked by a broken wheel, on Monday. Several cars were demolished, killing a man named Gould, of Stratford, and seriously injuring his nephew. Eleven cars of stock and emigrants' effects and seven passenger coaches composed the train. A large number of cattle were killed. Gould and his nephew were in the car with the stock.
