Her Majesty's birthday was celebrated on Monday, in this village, in a most loyal and enthusiastic manner. The day was observed as a general holiday, and the weather was as fine as could be desired. The sun shone forth in all its glory, and the change from the recent continual wet days was all the more appreciated, and the citizens first out on parade to celebrate the sixty-first anniversary of the nativity of Her Majesty Queen Victoria. The joyousness of the business portion of the village were neatly decorated, and a display of bunting was made. There was a large gathering of people from the neighboring towns and villages, and the surrounding country was fully represented. Considerable interest was manifested in the games and amusements of the day, and the number of entries to the general games was large, though it did not come up to that of last year. It is estimated that the number of visitors exceeded that of any previous year, there being probably between 3,000 and 4,000 present.
