Street Lamps to be ERECTED.

The Municipal Council of the Village of Action met in the Council Chamber on Friday evening, 5th inst., pursuant to adjournment. Mearbeck present, Mr. D. Henderson, in the chair, Meares, W. H. Storer, D. D. Christie, and N. McGarvin.

Moved by D. D. Christie, seconded by N. McGarvin, that Mrs. Samuel Sceight be paid the sum of \$1.67, being two-thirds value of one sheep killed by dogs. Carried.

The Committee on Streets and Sidewalks reported that they had laid 788 feet of sidewalk since last meeting, and the several accounts are laid before the Finance Committee.

Moved by D. D. Christie, seconded by D. D. Christie, that the report of the committee on streets and sidewalks be adopted. Carried.

The Finance Committee presented the following estimate of receipts and expenditures for the current year, and recommended that the several rates named be levied by by-law for the purpose required:

Moved by D. D. Christie, seconded by W. H. Storer, that the estimate of the Finance Committee for the current year be adopted. Carried.

The following by-laws were introduced, read the required number of times, and passed:

A by-law to raise the money required for Action Public School for the current year.

A by-law to provide for the expenses of the village of Action for the current year.

A by-law to appoint a collector of taxes for the year 1880.

A by-law to appoint a constable for the village of Action.

The Finance Committee presented their eighth report and recommended payment of the several accounts:

Dykes, building sidewalks, 25.50. C. T. Hill, nails, 6.55. Selection of juries, 9.00. J. McLean, nails, 1.65. Total, \$155.77.

Moved by W. H. Storer, seconded by D. D. Christie, that the eighth report of the Finance Committee be adopted. Carried.

Moved by N. McGarvin, seconded by D. D. Christie, that the sum of two dollars be levied and collected as statutory labor tax from each male inhabitant of the village entitled to pay the same, that such sum be paid to the collector appointed to receive the same not later than the first day of December next, and that the rest of the corporation be attacked thereto. Carried.

Moved by W. H. Storer, seconded by D. D. Christie, that the committee on streets and sidewalks be instructed to erect as many street lamps as they deem necessary, not exceeding twenty, arrangements to be made for lighting with the persons opposite whose premises they are situated, with a view to making them as inexpensive to the corporation as possible. Carried.

Moved by W. H. Storer, seconded by D. D. Christie, that the offer of J. E. McGarvin of fifty cents per lamp for the privilege of advertising on street lamps be accepted, provided that the style of advertisement be approved of by a committee consisting of the reeve, the master and warden. Carried.

Council adjourned to meet at the call of the reeve.
