THE MARKETS. —The following are present prices: Fall Wheat, 1.05 to 1.10; Treadwell, 1.10 to 1.12; Spring, 1.10 to 1.15; Oats, 55c; Peas, 65c; Butter, 12c to 15c; Eggs, 10c to 12c; Potatoes, 40c to 45c.

In Acton it costs the owner about \$2.00 to let his cow run on the streets for an hour or two, but for \$1.25 he can secure good pasture for a month.

HIGH TEMPERATURE. —The Highest temperature recorded at Toronto meteorological office in May was 93 degrees, being the highest point recorded in that month since the observatory was established, in 1841. From all parts of the province reports of intensely hot weather have been received, the temperature at different points varying between 85 and 92 degrees.
