THE WOOL MARKET.

The demand for common Canadian wool this year is likely to be very limited, the price paid at the opening of the market was very low, being two or three cents less than was paid at the opening of the market last year.

The Scott Act in Lambton

The Scott Act, which came into force in the county of Lambton a month ago, has been set aside by the judges in Toronto by the mere technicality, viz:—On the ground that the polling took place on the same day as nomination for the Local Legislature.

G. T. R. Accident at Georgetown

On Sunday morning about six o'clock thirteen cars of a freight train going east on the Grand Trunk Railway ran off the track a short distance west of the Georgetown station, and on the highest part of the embankment several of the cars rolled down the steep incline at each side, and were almost completely demolished.

About eight o'clock on Monday morning seven cars of a G. T. R. train laden with hogs, ran off the track at Malton. A large number of hogs were killed. It was several hours before the wreck was cleared away, during which time traffic was almost suspended on this division.

A man named John Halliday, from the Forks of the Credit, was run over on Saturday by the up train from Elora, on the O. V. R., a short distance from Melville. The cars passed over both legs, just below the knee, grinding them to a pulp.

Nassagaweya Council

This council met pursuant to adjournment on Monday, the 3rd day of May. Members all present, the record in the chair.

By-law read the required number of times and passed. Mr. McPhedran moved, seconded by Mr. Norrish, that a by-law be passed to legalize the deviation of the allowance for road between the sixth concessions of the townships of Nassagaweya and Erasmose, and that the same be now read a first time. Carried.

Mr. Norrish moved, seconded by Mr. Watson, that James McGregor be appointed Pathmaster in Div. No. 50, in place of Peter McDonald. Carried.

Mr. Menzies moved, seconded by Mr. Norrish, that David Wheelihan, Esq., be, and is hereby appointed by this council, on their behalf, to confer and negotiate with the C. V. R. Company concerning the erection of a passenger station and grain warehouse as per agreement, at Campbellsville, near the Guelph Road, also the deviation and grading of the public travelled road to and from the Railway crossing. Carried.

On motion, the following accounts were ordered to be paid, viz:—T. J. Searrett, \$23.00 for 200 copies of minutes and by-laws for the year 1881, and the financial statements for the years 1879 1880, and T. J. Day, \$7.95 for blanks. Carried.

On motion the council adjourned, and the members thereof organized as a Court of Revision and Appeal, the record in the chair.
