Such are the remarks one sometimes beats about newspapers Do the good people who speak in this way ever reflect on the fact that with out advertisements no newspaper could exist for any length of time! The amount obtained from the patrons of a paper as mere aubscriptions, would not bur the paper on which it is print ed and oil the machinery which prints it . By advertisements, and advertisements mainly, a newspaper is main most enterprising and judiciously. managed journal would speedily lan guish and die unless its mblisher happened to be blessed with abundant Juivate capital. Hence the absurdity of condemning a newspaper because its columns are well supplied with advertisements. A Aberal advertising patsonage is the best possible thing for the reader as well as for the publisher, as it enables the latter to keep the other departments of his paper in higher state of efficiency.

no special interest to the general reader ! It is far otherwise. commercial or professional man who does not carefully soen the advertising columns of his local paper does not know his business. About the first thing a keen, shrewd, live man of business des when he lifts a newspaper is to peruse the new advertisements, whether they relate to the line in which he is engaged or not. There is no better index of the business prosperity of a town or city than the advertising columns of a local newspaper. We can form a pretty accurate idea of the state of trade in any town in Ontario any week in the year, by glancing at the advertising columns of our ex changes - Erchange.

### OUGHT TO BE PUNISHED.

The man who deliberately sets fire to a clearing when he knows the surrounding woods are as dry as tinder and liable to be ignited by a spark can expect no sympathy from others should he lose by the operation. This practice of firing a clearing during such dry weather should be stopped. ## The Great Fire in Michigan

Terrible reports, probably exagger ated, come from the Michigan fires. The countres of Haron, Sanilac, Tuscola, Legislative grant to Acton, Wells and Ellington are over run by the flames.
