HOW DOES YOUR BUSINESS STAND?

Stock-taking is not one of the most attractive jobs in the world, but it can be so great, that even at the risk of raising considerable dust, good business men tackle it and submit to its inconvenience, although it may be from a sense of duty rather than pleasure.

Stock-taking is the pride of any business, and by the results and indications a merchant can form a tolerably correct idea of whether his business is healthy or the reverse.

At this season of the year, when the flush of the holiday trade has subsided, most merchants have a short breathing spell, and in no way do we think it could be more profitably employed than in taking stock, working up accounts and balancing one's books.

A great many merchants, we presume, try to say, seem to think that these operations are only secondary to that of selling goods, but we think that every merchant of experience will tell us in the statement, that they were of paramount importance to any successful business, and should not be neglected or made to give way for anything else.

We would advise all our readers who have hitherto neglected stock-taking and balancing their books, to commence as soon as possible, and we are satisfied that if they do it thoroughly one year they will be so well satisfied with the information they have obtained from their own business that they will never again neglect it.—*Fr.*

THE DOMINION PARLIAMENT.

Opening of the Fourth Session.

The fourth session of the formal Parliament of the Dominion of Canada was opened on Tuesday with the usual attendant ceremonies by His Excellency, the Governor-General. The galleries for hours before his arrival were crowded, principally by ladies. There was literally a jam, and several fainted from the excessive heat. At 3 o'clock His Excellency the Governor-General drove from Rideau Hall to the Parliament Buildings. The customary salute was fired by the Ottawa Field Battery. Shortly after 3 o'clock His Excellency arrived and proceeded to State chamber. The Commons having been summoned to the bar of the chamber he then read the speech from the Throne.

Kasagawaya Council.

The Council met Monday the 6th day of February. Members all present, the reeve in the chair.

Mr. Wheelihan moved, seconded by Mr. Norris, that the sum of \$287.33 be paid to the several parties for expenses in connection with the last Municipal Election. Carried.

Mr. Wheelihan moved, seconded by Mr. Norris, that the account of Mr. Thomas Edging, hotel, and the stable and shed south of the meeting building be set off. Mr. Edging's furniture was nearly all removed, in a more or less damaged state, but the effects of Mrs. Gurney, who was living in the other building, were destroyed. The hotel and shop occupy the street, belonging to Mr. Archibald McNab, very narrowly escaped destruction, and were only saved by the energetic and persistent efforts of a number of citizens, who have on several former occasions exhibited their liberality and judgment in a similar manner, but every citizen who was present showed his willingness to assist, by doing what ever he could to stay the flames. The town of Mr. C. S. Smith and the Public School grounds were covered with cinders. The hotel property was owned by Mr. E. D. Ferencik, of Georgetown. Loss about \$1,000.00 insurance unknown. There is no insurance on Mr. Edging's property, and his loss will be about \$750. This is the fourth time he has been burned out. Our citizens sympathize with him in his loss.

The old hotel property destroyed was built about 35 years ago, and in the last pile of old wooden buildings in the village, and our little town is now devoid of the old rickety buildings many of which are so frequently seen in small towns. They have all been burned down, or else removed, and improved by the owners.

As has been the case after every fire during the past ten years, every person in town is talking about the necessity of the organization of a fire company for the protection of village property. The Inspector. Carried.
