

Editorial Notes.

After supplying the home and foreign demand, the United States will have a surplus of 100,000,000 bushels of wheat. Bread ought to be cheap this winter.

Contributions from America to the London League have ceased, the movement having collapsed. This is a great evidence that the League is doing its work satisfactorily.

It is evident that the wheat crop in foreign countries is good. Already this has resulted in a decline in prices in European markets, and in fact it is beginning to tell on the local market. Those who have looked for a rise will doubtless be disappointed.

England to Occupy Egypt.

The British Government has decided to maintain an army of occupation in Egypt. It would be hard to do otherwise under the circumstances. When a force to take the place of the regulars will have been established, it will be practically under British control, and Egypt may henceforth be regarded as a dependency of the crown of Great Britain.

The Scott Act.

A writer in the Milton Champion last week commences an article as follows: "The Act known by this name has been, we believe, on its trial in Milton and through the county of Hants for more than five months, and, judging by its working, it has been condemned by all unbiased and unprejudiced men. It is, we believe, a fact not to be questioned or denied, that instead of our enjoying under it a reign of sobriety, there are more ardent spirits consumed, and consequently there is more inebriety than ever before."

We have always a sense of respect for the opinions of others, but if the writer of the above paragraph calls himself an "unbiased and unprejudiced man," we are forced to the conclusion that Webster's definitions of those words are erroneous, and the public must look elsewhere for their meaning. It is indeed a fact that liquor is being sold in small quantities in the county, and by some of our best and most respected citizens. We challenge the writer to prove that one fourth the quantity of liquor sold six months ago, is being sold in this County at present.

Esqueuing Fall Exhibition.

The annual exhibition of Esqueuing agricultural society was held in George town last Friday. The weather was as fine as could be wished but the attendance was smaller than has been known for years. In many particulars the show was inferior to former years, and taken altogether it cannot be considered a success. This may be accounted for in a measure, from the fact that Brampton show was held on the same day and many who would otherwise have attended the Esqueuing fair with exhibits, preferred the larger exhibition and went to Brampton.

The exhibit inside the building was not up to the average, with the exception of that of vegetables. Fruit is not so plentiful this year, and the quantity shown was small. The show therefore in this department was meagre. Ladies' work was very fair and some really good specimens were shown in a few classes. Outside the show was very fair and a very creditable show of live stock was made. Some fine horses were shown and several prizes came to Acton, among which were James Matthews, first prize for carriage team, an Abram Scaffer, first prize for two year old stallion; Mr. A. Waldie secured a large number of prizes on sheep. We have not succeeded in obtaining a detailed copy of the prize list. It is now almost an established fact that the show is to be held in Acton next year, and this will no doubt have the effect of greatly revivifying it.
