Esqueuing Township Council.

The Council met as a Court of Revision. The members having severally taken and subscribed the oaths required by law, on motion appointed N. Lindsay, Esq., Reeve, as Chairman. The Clerk read over the list of appeals as follows:

The above appeals having been heard and decided as follows: F. E. Near, appeal dismissed; J. & J. Eccles, assessment on real property reduced \$200; Alex. Wheeler, to be entered as tenant of E. pt. 23, con. 5, 6, 460, Robert Wheeler, aged 37, to be entered as freeholder thereof, and assessed for personal property \$100; John Hanley, to be entered on roll as tenant W. pt. 7, con. 1, 24 acres, value \$1150, now assessed to James Wilson as owner...

of pt. 8, con. 7, one-fifth of an acre, value \$200, that amount to be deducted from Abraham Neilson's assessment, and the name of Andrew Neilson, as farmer's son, to be struck off; Charles Anthony to be inserted on roll as tenant of E. pt. 30, con. 3, 100 acres, Richard Anthony owner; Francis Kent, error in schedule corrected; James Young, name to be entered as joint owner of W. pt. 22, con. 7. On the application of John Newton, Robert Beatty was assessed and entered as tenant of pt. 22, con. 6, half an acre, value \$200, the same to be deducted from the assessment of John Newton & Sons. On the application of Angus Ferguson, his name was entered as owner of pt. 22, con. 11, instead of Jas. Kerr.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Graham, that the Court do now adjourn for the space of two hours, and that the Council sit for the transaction of general business.—Carried.

The Council then met, the Reeve in the chair. All the members present. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed, several accounts having been presented and read.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Warren, that \$2.83 be paid to Jacob Brooks, being two-thirds value of one sheep and two lambs killed by dogs, the owners being unknown.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Warren, that the sum of \$35 be granted to repair the road and hills on the 10th line, near Jos. Thompson's, and that Jos. Thompson and Fred. Near be commissioned to expend the same.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Dr. Webster, that the sum of \$15, of her taxes, be refunded to the widow of the late Alex. Mann, jr., she being in indigent circumstances.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Williams, that the sum of \$30 be granted for making two culverts, and improving the cross road between lots 22 and 23 in con. 1.—Carried.

Moved by Dr. Webster, seconded by Mr. Williams, that the sum of \$30 be granted to Capt. James Curry and Appelbe, for the purpose of purchasing butter and milk for the men of their respective companies during camp drill, as those necessaries are not supplied by the Government.—Carried.

The following report was presented and read:—To the REEVE AND COUNCIL.—Your committee appointed to examine the roads referred to in the petition of Mr. Peter Gibbons and others, and the roads mentioned in the petition of Mr. Patrick Lamb and others, beg leave to report as follows:—

First, your committee examined the said roads and found them in much need of repair: that we advertised and let a contract of stamping, removing stone, and otherwise improving the first line from lots 17 to 22 inclusive, amounting to \$50; also made a grant of \$25 on the cross road, 23 and 26, in the 2nd con. Mr. Patrick Lamb and Mr. Wm. McLean consent to expend the same.

Moved by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Graham, that the report on the petition of Mr. Patrick Lamb and others, and the petition of Mr. Peter Gibbons and others, be a report, and that the said amounts of \$25 and \$50 respectively be paid by the Treasurer when the commissioners report that the work is done.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Williams, that Mr. Henry Lawson and Mr. Chas. Scott be authorized to get the stamps on the cross road, between lots 5 and 6 in the 6th con., pulled.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Williams, seconded by Mr. Warren, that the sum of \$10 be granted to make a culvert, and for gravelling the 9th line, lot 30, James Marshall, com'r., also \$10 for improving the hill on the 8th line, lot 27, Mr. Boles, com'r.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Warren, seconded by Mr. Williams, that the following committee be appointed, viz.:—Mr. Lindsay and the mover, to examine the 6th line, lot 30; Mr. Lindsay and the mover, the cross road, lots 22 and 23, in the 3rd con., and Mr. Graham and Mr. Lindsay, the Speyside cross road and 4th line, with power to order such repairs as they consider necessary.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Warren, that a committee to examine the lower line, lot 13, and take such steps as they think proper for putting the same in proper repair.—Carried.

Moved by Mr. Graham, seconded by Mr. Warren, that the Treasurer be instructed to pay John Kennedy, Postmaster, \$15, to be expended in his road division.—Carried.

The Court of Revision resumed its sitting, and on the application of Mr. Robert Starret, Mrs. Starret was assessed for 80 acres, of lot 27, con. 10, at \$2,000 instead of 200 acres, and Robert Starret for 120 acres of same lot as owner, for \$2,500, and for personal property \$120, and the name of Robert Starret, as farmer's son, struck off. The Court then adjourned until Monday, 18th June, at 10 o'clock, a.m. Stewarttown, June 4, '83.
