Marquis of Lansdowne.

The Marquis of Lansdowne, who has been appointed Governor-General Canada, and his wife, who is a daughter of the First Duke of Abercorn, and is a lad of great personal attractions and literary attainments, will sail from Europe in October, and begin their residence at Rijeau Hall, the seat of the Governor-General of the Dominion.

Since the occupancy of that position by the accomplished statesman, Lord Dufferin, and the royal incumbents, who are soon to leave us, it has become an honor of high distinction.

The new Governor-Gozeral is the fifth Marguis of Lansdowne, his full name being Charles Keith Fitzmaurice. He is spoken of by the Marquis of Lorne as a man of great administrative ability. Although only 38 years of age, he has already filled the position of Lord of the Treasury and Under Secretary for India in a manner which has added greatly to the honor of

Because of a difference of opinion in regard to the land policy of Ireland, where he was a large owner, he retired from Mr. Gladstone's Cabinet, and while he was not actually opposed the Government, it has read :been cenerally understood that it did not meet with his entire approval.

His acceptance of the appointment a Governor-General of Canada is considered an indication of reconciliation with Mr Gladstone.

The Outlook.
