They will not go to the public house at first for love of liquor-very few people like the taste of liquor-they go for the animated and hilarious companiouship they find there, which they discover does so much to repress the disturbing restlessness in their breasts. See to it. then, that homes compete with public places in attractiveness. Open your blinds by day, and light bright fires at night. Illeminate your rooms. Hang pictures upon the walls. Put books and and entertaining games. Banish the dullness and spathy that have so long ruled in your household, and bring in mirth and good cheer. Invent diversions. While you make home a delight fill them with higher purposes than more pleasure. Whether they shall pass happy boyhood and enter upon manhood with refined tastes and noble ambition, depends on you. Do not ! Acton. blame barkeepers if your sons wander into the wrong path. Believe it possible that, with exertion and right means, a mother may have more control over the destiny of her boys than any other influence whatever.

#### Notes and Comments.

The temperance people of Oxford, Ontario, have gone vigorously to work to have the Scott Act accepted and enforced in that county. The county is a large and important one and the people being mostly farmers of the best class the prospects of success are good. Meetings are being held and a vigerous campaign is in progress.

Hon. Edward Blake and Hon. O. Mowat have left for the Old Country. Hon. Alexander McKenzie is already there. Sir Charles Tupper is also on the road, and Sir Leonard Tilley starts in a few days. Sir John McDonald, it is stated, intends taking a trip to Manitoba in August. He has never visited the Northwest yet, and will likely be accorded a most hearty reception.

The present year has already been quite remarkable for the numerous calamities which have resulted in a frightful destruc tion of life and property. To this series of disasters is to be added the terrible occurrence at Victoria Hall, in Sunderland, Eng., on Saturday night last when some two hundred children were trampled and crushed to death. The details of the horrible scenes enacted are simply heartrending.

There seems to be a good dea! of unnecessary mystery about the actual condition of the Queen. When we read the Prince of Wales attended a horse race the other day and bet \$25,000, we scarcely believe that his mother is so seriously ill as recent reports would indicate. If it were true, as reported that she intends abdicating we should regard it as a sign of serious ill health; but there is no proof that it is true Let us all hope for the best .- London Advertiser.

It is said that Prince Leopold the Dake of Albany-before the appointment of Lord Lansdowne-received a request to consent to be the successor of the Marquis of Lorne as Governor-General of the Dominion. The Duke looked up the affairs of Canada and wrote to Mr. Gladstone of his readiness to govern Canada. The prime minister replied that the Duke was too young and lacked experience in governmental work. The New York Herald says :- " This is not "a slight to the Duke, who is a very " amiable, cultured, and high-minded young "man. It is justice to the Canadians, who "have no desire for the fopperies and frip-" peries which make court life so ridiculous "in London."

# Halton County Schools.

The minutes, etc., of the County Council for 1862, has been received. Important among other matters contained in this volume is the annual report of R. Little, Esq. Public School Inspector of the county from which we glean the following interest-

ing facts :-RECEIPTS AND EXPENDITURES. The total receipts from all sources, inluding the balances from Del, amounted to \$51,169.44-increase, \$8,735.70.

The total expenditure for the year s mounted to \$14,019.92-increase, \$7,165.413 The disbursements were as follows: For teachers' salaries, \$30,506.15-de-

crease, \$145.60. For sites and building school-houses \$8,179.06-increase, \$6,470.76.

For libraries, maps, apparatus, and prize books, \$57.20-increase, \$15.25. For rent, repairs, fuel, lighting fires, and other incidental expenses, \$5,277.51-in crease, \$1,510.29}.

Under the heading of "Expenditure for purchase of school site and building school houses," forty-eight sections paid nothing two sections in Nelson paid \$321.72, and six in Esquesing paid \$2,165.07. Oakville paid \$67.00; Burlington, \$456.00; Acton \$1,333.45, and Milton, \$3,835.82.

STABLE OF SCHOOLS. Including all departments taught in separate rooms and keeping registers their own, the number of schools in opera tion at the close of 1882 was 85, viz.: In Milton 5, Georgetown 5, Burlington 5, Oakville 5, Acton 3, Nelson 13, Nassagaweye 10. Esquesing 21, Trafalgar 18. For a part of the year there were 87 departments in operation. All the school premises are reported as freehold.

STHOOL POPULATION. The number of children between 5 and 21 years, according to the Assessment Roll of 1882, was 7,140, showing an increase of

The number of children between 5 and 6 -school age-in the different municipalities was as follows: Acton, 235-decrease 9: Georgetown, 371-increase, 17; Burlington, 353-fucrease, 8; Milton, 299decrease, 39; Oakville, 425-increase, 72 Nassagaweya, 761-decrease, 37; Esques ing, 1,187-decrease, 65; Trafalgar, 978decrease, 57; Nelson, 742-decrease, 56.

The daily average attendance of pupils for the year, compared with the number enrolled, was, in the different municipalities, as follows: Acton, 48 per cent .- gain, 3 per cent. , Genrgetown, 48 per cent .- loss, 3 per cent. Burlington, 48 per cent .gain, 8 per cent. Oakville, 54 per cent .gain, 3 per cent. Milton, 55 per cent .- loss, 4 per cent. Kelson, 46 per cent.-Gain, 3 per cent. Nassagaweya, 44 per cent.-loss, l per cent. Trafalgar, 47 per cent.-gain, 3 per cent. Esquesing, 44 per cent.-loss,

2 per cent. Quite a large percentage of the pupils failed to attend school the requisite number of days during the year. The attendance for Halton was, however, higher than the average attendance throughout the province.

TEACHERS' BALARIES. The highest salary paid a male teacher was \$600; the lowest, \$275. The average salary of male teachers in the townships (including the incorporated villages) was \$416.63-increase, \$8.85; of female teachers, \$293.79-increase, \$5.71. The salary-of thirty-eight teachers did not exceed \$850 per annum; thirty-six teachers received between \$351 and \$450; nine between \$451 and \$550; and two received over \$550.
