He strove to learn a good deal about it, and he did his very best to advertise its merits to the world. By his well-meant efforts he has obtained much good-will. There is, however, nothing like poignant regret over his departure. His personality is not strong enough to captivate the affections of a community. He never said anything that anyboby can remember, and never did anything of the least consequence. His political reflections are in dull contrast to the brilliant utterances of the great Irishman, his predecessor. Indeed, there are few men in the Empire who could make a happy appearance in shoes warm from the feet of Lord Dufferin. And the Marquis can never be more than one of the many. He is a respectable man, with greatness thrust on him, who has the ambi tion to try and appear graceful under the load. Hence he would make a slightly absurd appearance even if he was not

a remarkable liking for every kind of Canadian society, except the imitation English element. She was kind and sympathetic with the poor wherever she resided for any length of time; very appreciative of the practical side of the quaint humble life of Lower Canada; good to any childpeople but for those ashamed to acknowledge themselves of the Canadian people, it was for the sham-aristocratic, imitation-English, grovelling poor creatures who imagined they had a special right to be entertained by her. They wanted to feel tremendously like courtly people if possible, they wanted the Princess to enable them to pose as "the real thing," and she appears to have trampled ruthlessly on their preposterous aspirations. Good luck to her, she is a noble lady, and democracy in Canada owes something to her .- Lr.

(Crowded out last week, OUR HOLIDAY TRIP. Interesting Jottings By The Way.

On Tuesday morning. Aug. 7th, we left by the early train for Ottawa, for the purpose of attending the Grand Lodge I. O. O. F., as the favored representative of Acton Lodge, No. 204. The trip to the Capital was unattended with any matter of interest, further than the continual addition to our ranks at nearly every stopping place along the route, of representatives of other Lodges. Our destination reached, we-the Grand Loige representatives-were escorted up town by one of the excellent city bands, which was followed by a strong detachment of the Kingston Uniformed Patriarchs, and the arrival of our company was apparently an event of considerable interest to the citizens.

At the kind invitation of the city brethren the representatives attended a grand demonstration, arranged for the occasion, in the Dominion Park in the afternoon, and as the day had been set apart for a civic heliday in the city, everything presented a holiday appearance, and a very enjoyable half day was spent. In the evening a promenade concert, under the patronage of Sir John A. McDonald, was held in the splendid Military Hall of the city, and an entertainment of more than ordinary interest was provided. Six or eight hours of each of the two following days were spent in sessions, of the Grand Lodge, the remainder being taken up in viewing the "lions" of the city.

Daring our stay in Ottawa we visited the Parliament Buildings, the departmental offices, government library, grounds and park, Ridean Hall and grounds, Normal School, Collegiate Institute, the Basilicaand other churches of the city, Post Office and Customs House, Dufferin Bridge, Rideau Canal and locks, Chaudiere Falls, Suspension Bridge, the Mammoth Lumber Mills, and other points of minor interest.
