The New Methodist Church.

Notice of an application to parliament for an Act to incorporate the Methodist Church on the basis of union just adopted has been given at Ottawa.

According to the census the four Methodast Churches, which may now be considered as united, form the largest religious denomination in Canada, the number of members being 739,160. This number is made up as follows: Methodist Church of Canada, 582,962; Episcopal Methodists. 103,272; Bible Christian, 22,236; Primitive Methodists, 25,680. The Presbyterian Church numbers 629,280, and the Church of England 574,818. Before the union the Presbyterian body was the most numerous of any one denomination of Protestants.

Notes and Comments.

An array of big figures is going the rounds of the press setting forth the gross earnings of the St. Paul, Minneapolis & Manitobe Railway for the past year exceeded \$924,000,000. The operating expenses were over \$459,500,000, leaving the net earnings at over \$464,500,000. Imagine a million and a half net profit a day to divide among half-a-dozen gentlemen. The figures would be entirely incredible did the public not well know that it has taken almost a small fortune to send a single carload of freight to the Northwest.

Another Railway Wanted. Guelph Anxious for a Branch of the

Credit Valley. A meeting of the Guelph Board of Trade was held last Wednesday night to consider the advisability of securing connection with the Credit Valley Railway. The Board composed of the leading manufacturers and merchants of the city, who are unanimous in the opinion that connection with the C V. Railway at Schaw, or some place near there, was most desirable in the interests of the Royal City-a branch line of about eleven mills, at a cost of about \$160, 000. The board discussed the matter at great length, and appointed a committee to confer with the Railway Committee of the City Council. It is proposed to apply for a charter at once and have an interview with the railway company, so that this scheme, which has been agitated more than once, may yet assume definite shape.
