> Serious Acadent. On Tuesday, while engaged in chopping in the bush, alone, Mr. Thomas Lamb, of the fifth concession, near this village, met with an accident of a very serious and painful character. In this condition he lay for about three hours, with his face in the snow, before any one became aware of his perilous condition. It is ascertained that Mr. Lamb's injuries are of a most serious nature. A deep gash is cut in his head, his arms and one leg seem to be paralyzed, as well as minor injuries. The physician in attendance enterains strong hopes for his recovery.

School Matters in Milton.
