FIGHTING THE SCOTT ACT.

To us there seems no stronger evidence required of the unqualified success of the Scott Act than the fact of the enormous subscriptions that are being so generally and voluntarily donated, not alone by the liquer sellers, but by the liquor manufacturers, to the fund which is being raised by the Licensed Victuallers of the province . for the purpose of fighting the Scott Act in those counties in which it is intended to be submitted.

At a recent meeting of brewers, distillers and others concerned in the liquor traffic held in Toronto, between \$30,000 and \$40,-000 was subscribed to a fund established for the purpose of fighting the Scott Act in the coming campaign. Of this sum Messrs. Gooderham & Worts, wholesale distillers Toronto, subscribed \$10,000. The association expects to raise \$100,000. The meeting pledged itself not to deal with or support any wholesale wine or spirit merchant, brewer, or distiller who does not contribute his share to the general fund now being

raised to fight the Scott Act movement. 'Query?'
