#### CANNED GOODS.

During the last session of the Dominion Parliament, a number of amendments were made to the Weights and Measures Act of 1879, of which the following is a most important one :--

"Every hermetically sealed package of canned goods, such as fruit, vegetables, fish and the like, shall have the weight of the contents of the tin, can, or package containing the some legibly marked on it; and any packer or other person found guilty of selling or exposing for sale such goods, in any such tin can or package, on which the weight of the contents is not marked, or on which such weight is misrepresented, shall for the first offence incur a panalty of two dollars for each such tin, can or package. and for each subsequent offence a penalty of not less than three nor more than twento dollars for each such tin, can or pack-

"This section shall come into force on the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and eighty-five."

They offered a prominent Conservative orator \$300 a week and/expenses the other day to take up the cudeels on their behalf, but ! declined. The battle will last all summer -Toronto News.

The Toronto Neuce says :-

"In considering the drink question, i should be borne in mind that there are two classes of drinkers. Those who drink be cause they like liquor for its own sake, and those who drink because it is customary or fashionable, or a token of friendship, or sociability. The latter class are largely in the majority, especially among the young. The fallacy of the popular argument that "men will have .liquor," and "you can't make men moral by act of parliament," is that it only applies to those who have a decided taste for liquor. As regards the second class, those who merely drink from social or conventional motives, it does not apply. If you can make it inconvenient or disreputable to drink; if the custom can be robbed of the charm of good fellowship and geniality, they will have no temptation to follow it. And the rising generation circuit of the Methodist Church, at Gali will have still less temptation to sequire it. this week. This is precisely the strong point of the Scott Act and other systems of legal prohibition, which their opponents have altogether lost eight of.
