The conflict against the attempted repeal of the Scott Act in Halton, was brought to its final issue on Tuesday, and resulted in a glorious victory for the supporters of the Act. The contest was not fought in the interest of Acton alone, as the whole Dominion was effected by the result, and the battle-was consequently a most important one: immense significance being placed upon the verdict of the people of this County, after a two year's trial of the Act. The friends of both sides of the question were fully cognizant of the importance of the contest and each put forth every effort to ensure victory. The Act's supporters had great odds to fight against. The liquor manufacturers, feeling that their "craft was in danger," centered their whole influence on Halton, and it is an open secret that the Scott Act party had not only to contend with a large brigade of distillers, brewers and hotel-keepers, but with an extensive fund furnished by these men for bribery purposes. On the other hand the temperance people had a very perfect organization. being able to enlist into active and practical service a much larger number of workers than their opposents could bribe to de the work of the campaign. This, and the fact that the supporters of the Act could conscientionaly go into the contest with energy and honestly appeal to the conscicuces of the electors, while the influence exerted on the other side was in every way selfish, degrading, and in opposition to the better natures of those approached, show very clearly how the victory was attained. It certainly speaks volumes for the incorruptible character of the electors of Halton that they withstood the-temptation of the liberal bribery offered, and expressed their opinion fairly and squarely upon the merits of the question. In Acton the interest in the election was only manifested during the day by the activity of the leaders in bringing out the electors, and so thoroughly was this work performed, that at the close of the poll only three possible votes remained unreconted. As the hour of five o'clock approsched excitement began to wax warmer, and before the ballots had been counted, a large number of people had congregated at the polling places eagerly awaiting the result. At 5.20 p. m., the state of the poll in Acton was announced and presented a most favorable showing for the friends of the Act-10 against the repeal-verifying the figures of the committee to within a comple of votes. This carried consternation into the camp of the Anti's, as they felt, and had freely expressed themselves confident that the majority here would not exceed 10 or 12. Shortly after this the returns began to come in from other polling places and the telegraph office was besieged by the anxious ones of both parties. All the places unfavorable to the Act seems to be reported first and the Anti's for a time felt not a little jubilant. But in a little while the majorities against the petition were announced, and by half-past eight it was evident that the Act had been sustained by an increased majority. From this time forth the temperance party was left almost exclusively in possession of the telegraph office, and there were very few of

their opponents to be seen anywhere. Never was more interest exhibited by the people of this municipality on any public question: During the evening, Mill Street, in the vicinity of the telegraph office, was densely crowded, and when the ultimate result was announced nearly all suit, J. The prohibitionists are rejoicing over two notable victories achieved within as many days. The first was won in that time-honored temperance battle-ground the State of Maine, where the prohibitory amendment to the constitution was carried on Monday by a large majority. Hitherto Maine has only been a prohibition state by legislative enactment, which could of coure be repealed or modified at any time should the anti-prohibitionists find themselves in a majority, as was the case in 1856, when the law was temporarily repealed. The passage of the constitutional amendment makes it impossible to repeal the law without re-amending the constitution by a tedious process involving a popular vote ou the question. The vote just taken must be regarded as positive proof that the people of Maine are well satisfied with prohibition after a trial lasting for a third of a century. 
