Notes and Comments.

The actual yearly expenditures of all money for public schools in the whole country is at this time just about \$80,000,000.

An exchange says that the export cattle trade is dull at present, and the price of beef on foot is down several points. But the price in the butchers' shops remains high all the same. With both butchers and bakers it is "heads I win and tails you lose" every time.

A number of women dress reformers are wearing their new style of "togs" on the streets of Montreal. A light, plaited petticoat is divided into compartments so that trousers result. A skirt is worn over it, so that the costume does not appear mannish or indecent in the least. One of these suits weighs 44 pounds, or 7 or 8 pounds lighter than the average habilliment of women. A short method of settling the Scott Act controversy for the time being was that adopted in the counties of Northumberland and Durham. The theft from the sheriff's office of a copy of sheets containing one thousand signatures to the petition was an atrocious deed which renders it impossible for a vote to be taken before the end of the present year. The indignation of the promoters may be more easily imagined than described.

Esquing Fall Show.

The annual exhibition of Esquing Agricultural Society was held at Georgetown last Friday. Early in the morning, the prospects for a fine day were anything but promising, but the weather soon cleared up, and the afternoon proved faultless. As we predicted, the extraordinary success of the exhibition at Acton last year had the effect of reminding it very considerably, and the show at Georgetown last Friday, although in many points inferior to that of the previous year, was better than any that has been held in Georgetown for several years. The attendance was quite satisfactory and the number of entries was good, all classes being very fairly represented. The hall this year presented an unusually fine appearance. The fruit, grain and roots classes were most creditable, while the display of ladies' work was such as to give the good ladies of this township a high standing for the execution of fine, durable, well made plain work and also for artistic and neatly designed articles in fancy goods. The exhibition of fine arts proved that both ladies and gentlemen are devoting considerable time and careful study to this pleasant and attractive pastime.

The show of stock was very good and would do credit to any township. The display of horses was especially fine, and that of cattle and sheep fully up to the average. In poultry a fine exhibit was made. Quite a number of the prizes for horses and sheep were captured by residents of Acton and vicinity.

The band contest was the centre of attraction to many during the afternoon. Three bands were entered for competition. Acton, Norval and Georgetown, and some really fine music was produced. Norval band succeeded in winning the red ticket, and although we feel that Acton band is very seldom obliged to take any but first place we certainly think the Norval boys honestly earned their laurels on this occasion. This band had with them an excellent band master, and the members all did their parts well. Acton, however, labored under a disadvantage, as their bandmaster was unavoidably absent, and one of the leading horns was obliged to take his part which naturally made considerable difference in the playing. Georgetown band played very nicely for a young band, but we hope they were not sufficiently presumptuous to expect a prize when Acton and Norval were in the contest. We must congratulate the Norval boys upon their success. For years they have competed with Acton but until last Friday never succeeded in winning first place, and they now naturally consider their victory an achievement of no mean merit.

Take all in all the fair was really a good one and we believe the officers led proud, and justly so, over its success. The show will of course be held in Acton again next year, and we have no doubt our citizens will do their utmost to make it a grand success.

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By-Law No.---

A BY-LAW to raise by way of loan the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars, to pay the purchase money of land for a Public Cemetery for the Village of Acton, and for the improvement of the same.

Whereas the Municipal Council of the Village of Acton have been petitioned to secure land for the purpose of a Public Cemetery.

And whereas for the purpose of paying the purchase money of said land, and improving the same, it will be necessary for the said Municipal Council to raise the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars.

And whereas it will require the sum of One Hundred and Forty Dollars to be raised annually by special rate on the whole rateable property of the Village of Acton for paying the said debt of Fifteen Hundred Dollars as hereinafter mentioned.

And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Village of Acton, according to the last revised assessment roll of the said Village of Acton, is One Hundred and Eighty-six Thousand, Four Hundred and Thirty-nine Dollars.

And whereas the amount of the debt of the said Village of Acton is Five Thousand and Twenty Dollars.

And whereas for paying the interest and creating a yearly sinking fund for paying the said sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars, it will require an annual special rate of Seventy-six hundredths of a mill in the dollars in addition to all rates to be levied in each year.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Village of Acton.

1st. That it shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Village of Acton to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of the Treasurer of the said Village for the purposes aforesaid with the object above recited.

2nd. That it shall be lawful for the said Reeve to cause any number of Debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required not less than One Hundred Dollars each and not exceeding in the whole amount the said sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars and that the said Debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Village of Acton and be signed by the said Reeve and countersigned by the Treasurer of the said Village.

3rd. That the said Debentures shall be made payable in twenty years at (unless from the day hereinafter mentioned by this By-Law to take effect at the office of the Treasurer of the said Municipality and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest.

4th. That the said Debentures shall bear interest at and after the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date thereof which interest shall be payable annually on the First day of December in each year at the office of the said Treasurer of the Village of Acton.

5th. That for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of the said Debentures and the interest at the rate aforesaid to become due thereon, a special rate of Seventy-six hundredths of a mill in the dollar shall in addition to all other rates be assessed, raised, levied and collected in each year upon all the rateable property in the said Village of Acton during the continuance of the said Debentures or any of them.

6th. That this By-Law shall take effect and come into operation on the First day of December, A. D. 1884.

And be it further enacted by the said Municipal Council that the votes of the electors of the said Village of Acton on the above By-Law shall be taken between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Five o'clock in the afternoon on Monday the Tenth day of November, A. D. 1884, at the Town Hall in the said Village of Acton and in Matthew's Hall in the said Village of Acton, and that John C. Hill, of the Village of Acton in the County of Halton, shall be Deputy Returning Officer at the polling place at Matthew's Hall, and that J. E. McGarrin shall be Deputy Returning Officer at the polling place in the Town Hall in the said Village of Acton, and that the Clerk of the Council shall sum up the

number of the votes given for and against the said By-Law at the Hall in the said Village of Acton, on the same day at the hour of six o'clock after the polling of the votes.

And further, that the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the various polling places on behalf of the respective parties promoting and opposing said By-Law, and at the said summing up of the votes by the Clerk shall be at the Council Chamber in said Village of Acton at eight o'clock p.m. of the Eighth day of November, A. D. 1884.
