Whereas the Municipal Council of the Village of Acton have been petitioned to secure land for the purpose of a Public Cemetery,

And whereas for the purpose of paying the purd se money of said land, and improving the same, it will be necessary for the said Municipal Council- to raise the sum of Fifteen Hundred Dollars.
