The average rural buying ground in the country shows but little of the good taste that marks those of the cities and larger towns. It is too often as desolate in ap pearance as it is solemn in its associations. It is frequently an example of the saddest kind of neglect. The fences enclosing it are often dilapidated and sometimes so low that cattle can walk over and greze on the graves. Thorns and thistles grow unmolested, while the dried stalks of last year's burdocks are monuments, not to the memory of the dead, but to the shiftlessness of the living. The wild grass waves and the weeds run in rank luxuriance where gleaming marble and fragrant flowers should record the virtues of the dead and testify to the tenderness of the living.

This appears to be a common thing, and is indeed a true picture of the premises known as " the cemetery,"-save the mark -in this municipality. Owing to this we must be discredited every day in the eyes of visitors, and they are no doubt almost led to conclude that Acton is inhabited by class of heathers, judging from the evident neglect to pay proper care and respect for tioned

And why is it that matters in this connection have been allowed to assume so neglected a state? Simply, because it has seen known for years that the present Cometery, being about filled up, was soon to be abandoned, and from this consideration very little attention has been paid to the improvement or beautifying of it, and many who have buried their departed loved ones, postpoued the erection of headstones and monuments until the new Cemetery was opened.

Four years ago a movement was set or foot for securing a new place of burial, but through the interference of certain parties interested in other property than that selected by the citizens committee, appointed by a citizens meeting to so select, the By-Law then submitted was defeated by a narrow majority. From that time to this the old burying place has remained uncared for, until now, from sanitary considerations, and the fact that the place is almost completely filled up, it has been considered absolutely necessary that steps be again taken to secure the most desirable and much needed end.

And again we find a number of people interesting themselves to secure a second defeat of the By-Law. And what are the reasons presented in opposition to this important matter? Are they reasonable? Are they charitable? Are they unselfish? Do they exhibit proper respect for the memory of those who have departed from our midst? Do those who oppose matter offer a more feasble scheme than that at present advanced? No. The objections made are almost invariably from selfish, unfeeling, non-progressive or un reasonable standpoints. This should not be. The new Cemetery is urgently needed. The committee composed of competent citizens, considered the proposed site a suitable one. The purchase of a Cemetery will certainly cause no perceptible increase in taxation, and can, we feel confident, be made a source of revenue. It will improve and lend attraction to our little town, and will show to the world that we have some respect for the memory of our departed

Let us all then, as property owners, qualified to vote on the By-Law, bury our difpresent and permanent success. By so doing we will benefit the place in which we live, and assist very materially in making the scheme financially successful. If, however, this unreasonable opposition continues, and the By-Law, is affected by it, there is trouble in store for this municipality. The old cemetery must be closed and a new one is consequently a necessity. The longer then the matter remains unsettled the more it will cost the place. If the By-Law is now defeated, it is only the question of a few months at furthest when it must be again submitted, and it must be known that the submission of a By-Law is a matter of no little expense. Again, the proposed property can be purchased now for a remarkably low price, and it cannot be presumed that it will remain at the figure named for any length of time. It will be economy from many points of view to carry the By-Liaw-now. Work for it and serve the best interests of your town.

Notes and Comments.

Steps are to be taken at once for the sub mission of the Scott Act in Toronto.

Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Fall into

Chorlottetown Sustains her

The Scott Act elections last Thursday all resulted victoriously. The combined counties of Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry gave a majority of 1749. It was carried in Dundas by a majority of 733 In not a single municipality was there a majority against it.

In Stormont the majority in favor of the Act is 572. There was a small majority of against it in Cornwall Township, and Finch of 15. In Cornwall town there ras 46 majority in its favor, and in the Township of Osnabruck the very large

In Glengarry the majority in favor of the Act is 444. In Lancaster the majority against it is 40, and in Lochiel 4, while in Charlottenbury the majority in favor is 254 and in Kenyon 26.

THE REPEAL DETELTED. In Charlottetown N. B. the election for the repeal of the Act proved that the people e satisfied with its working, notwithstandng the fact that the whole liquor interest of the province was centered in this contest, the repeal was defeated by 45 of a majority.
