Notes and Comments.

The republicans can lay their defeat to the temperance party, as over 300,000 prohibition votes were polled for St. John.

Voting on the Scott Act will take place in Brantford on the 11th December and in Leeds and Grenville on the 18th of the same month.

The Scott Act is certainly not political. For proof see the Reform County of Huron with its majority of 1659, and the Tory County of Dufferin with its solid 865.

The Wilson, N. Y. Ser is not a formidable newspaper, but it struck it about right when it gave these instructions to kill a town: "Always growl. Resist taxation. Kick against improvements."

The statue of the late Hon. Geo. Brown, to be erected in Queen's Park, Toronto, has arrived. It represents the late eminent statesman in the attitude of addressing an audience, with his left hand extended and his right holding a roll of parchment. The likeness is very striking, the well remembered features being brought out most faithfully.

The petition praying for the submission of the Scott Act in the county of Wellington was deposited in the Sheriff's office to-day, to issue to enable the Mercury to give in this issue the number of signatures in each municipality. The whole number of signatures, however, is 3,566, which is considerably above the third of the ratepayers.

On Wednesday evening, says a Teeswater correspondent, some persons broke a window and damaged the hall in the grocery store of R. F. Howson, of that village. Beneath the broken window was pasted a card bearing the legend—"There is Scott Act for you." Look out!

On the card was drawn a sketch of a coffin with a skull and crossbones.

The Scott Act was carried on Tuesday in Norfolk by a majority of 1,000. In Renfrew it was also carried by about 800 on Friday last. What a lot of fanatics and temperance crazies there are in Canada! We shall have to commission Goldwin Smith, and the Hamilton Spectator to enlighten these deluded people and save them from the dire consequences of their foolish acts.

The counting of the ballots in the recent U. S. Presidential election has been completed, and Cleveland is officially announced President elect. Judging from the despatches Blaine seems resigned to his defeat and graciously bows to the verdict of the people. The republican leaders in New York have apparently followed his example, and it will, we hope, be accepted in a similar spirit throughout the Union.

Acton Municipal Council.

Council met on Tuesday Evening. Members present Messrs. D. Henderson, C. S. Smith, D. Cameron and William Ismond. Upon motion Mr. Ismond took the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

The clerk reported the meeting By-Law defeated by a majority of fifteen. A By-Law to provide for the collection of statute labor tax was introduced, read the required number of times and passed, the name of Thos. Easton being inserted as collector.

The Finance Committee presented their 14th report, recommending payment of the following accounts: H. P. Moore, printing and advertising, 330 37; Selectors of Jurors, 3 00; Hart & Rawlinson, 1 78.

Moved by D. Henderson, seconded by C. S. Smith that the sum of \$13.60 be remitted, being taxes levied upon the Methodist Parsonage, for the current year, as the property not being liable for taxation. Carried.

Board of Education.

The Board of Trustees of Acton Public School met in the Council Chamber on Monday evening 17th Nov. Members all present. Mr. James Moore in the chair. Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

Moved by W. H. Storey, seconded by W. P. Brown that the application of Miss Mattie Draper, for second Department, at a salary of \$300 per annum, be accepted. Carried.

Moved by W. H. Lowry, seconded by Thos. C. Moore that the application of Miss Sarah Black for third department, at a salary of \$250 per annum, be accepted.

Moved in amendment by W. H. Storey, seconded by W. P. Brown, that the application of Miss Alice Baxter, at the same salary be accepted.

The Finance Committee presented their ninth report, recommending payment of the following sums: Thos. C. Moore, salary October, \$45 82; Miss C. Brown, " " " 30 31; Miss Jennie Grant, " " " 20 33; Luther Lyman, " " " 2 25; H. P. Moore, adv. for teachers &c., 1 80; Wm. Gurney, cutting wood, " 1 80.

Report adopted. Board then adjourned.

The World's Fair.

Eight hundred car loads have already been received at the World's Exhibition at New Orleans, La. So vast are the buildings that these exhibits are scarcely noticeable. It is estimated that 5,000 car loads will be received at the grounds. All preparations are well in hand. Commissioners of several European countries are on the ground arranging the exhibits. The General Bull company of Holland makes a grand display of 200,000 bulbs. General Diaz has notified the director general of enormous shipments of tropical plants and a steamer has been chartered by the exposition to bring the collection.

The funeral of the young man, last Friday, was largely attended, many from the village and surrounding country being present to pay their last respects to one who was universally esteemed and respected. Among the pall bearers we observed Mr. R. E. Nelson of Acton, one of the deceased most intimate friends in their schoolboy days.
