Twenty counties have voted on the Scott Act this year. Two don't want it, by small majorities comparatively, and eighteen will have it, they say by very substantial majorities.

A Mammoth Establishment Filling an Important Place in Acton's List of Manufacturers.

Its Extent and Capacity

In contemplating the progress and prosperity of an enterprising town like Acton, it is always pleasant and interesting to trace the establishment of any new business in our midst, or the extension and improvement of those already established.

Between forty and fifty years ago Acton's first tannery was built upon the site now occupied by the new one referred to by a Mr. A. Nells. Since that time the property has experienced many ups and downs. The buildings have thrice been destroyed by fire.

Having in the meantime disposed of their Braosebridge tannery, the firm again turned their attention to their Acton property, and in May 1883, they set to work to enlarge and rebuild, to remodel and improve the property and put the establishment into the condition necessary for a largely increased business.

The tannery is now one of the most extensive and fully equipped with all latest and best machinery, in the Dominion. It comprises six large buildings, four stone and two iron, all fireproof, as follows:—Main building, stone, 90x180 feet; two and a half stories; leach house, iron, 40x100 feet; crushing house, iron, 40x60 feet; rolling house, stone, 30x50 feet; and hide store, stone, 24x50 feet.

The tannery has a capacity of 600 finished sides per week, and the firm expect to manufacture about 25,000 or 30,000 per annum, worth from \$75,000 to \$100,000. To do this they will consume about 3000 cords of hemlock bark, at a cost of \$18,000.

The leather manufactured here is pronounced first-class in quality, by those competent to judge, and the whole output of the tannery finds a ready market. We look with considerable satisfaction upon the establishment of this important industry in our midst, and we feel confident that every citizen is ready to acknowledge and appreciate its importance as a labor-furnishing and money-circulating factor in the town we all delight to see prosper.
