Fire Protection.

Oakville has at last moved in the matter of providing apparatus for protection from the devouring element. The *Independent* of last week has the following:

"A long time what has been supplied. On Tuesday last we had the pleasure of examining, probably the most complete and fully equipped hook and ladder wagon in the dominion. It was manufactured at the Halton Carriage Works, by Messrs. Fairfield & Whitaker, for the Oakville fire department. The owners were so confident of its value that they offered it to us officially instead of a few days ago, and expressed themselves highly pleased, and to-day it was delivered to the town ready for use. For the benefit of our numerous readers who have not seen this useful acquisition, we will endeavor to give a brief description.—The wagon is furnished with a ladder 16 feet made up of one extension, 26 to 30 feet, and a folding one, so that they can be separated if required, one ordinary ladder of 20, and one of eighteen feet; two roof ladders of 12-feet each; two fireman's axes, and two common axes; two steel pointed crowbars, four feet six inches long; one large hook with twelve feet of chain; 40 feet of rope, one set of pike poles; two stay poles; 30 pails; four lanterns and the hand saw. These are so conveniently arranged that any piece can be got without interfering with the other, and is so lightly constructed that it can be taken off in case of the need by two or three men. We heartily congratulate the manufacturers for the success that has attended their efforts in supplying our town with such a creditable outfit."

Our ideas of Acton's requirements in the matter of appliances for protection from fire, are very well met in that above described. Add to it a properly organized volunteer company and Acton would have something to be relied upon in case of conflagration. For a country town we consider an efficient hook and ladder company with good apparatus more effective and satisfactory than either a hand or steam fire engine. The expense, too, is a great consideration; a hook and ladder company can be organized at an expense of a couple of hundred dollars, with very little subsequent expense, while an engine would cost as many thousands and is continually a matter of heavy expenditure for repairs. Will our municipal authorities consider this matter and move in the required direction, or will they wait, as Oakville did until our little town is visited by a \$30,000 conflagration?

The New School Readers.

Part I. of the "First Reader" of the new series authorized by the Ontario Minister of Education is now ready, and the second part will shortly be issued. The work is a great improvement in several respects on the old "First Readers." The letterpress is very clear and distinct, and the pictures are without exception the best in point of artistic execution we have ever seen in a school book. The general arrangement of the work is good, and there are some new features which will commend themselves to educationists. In pursuance of the scheme of the department to introduce industrial drawing in the school, the books contain simple designs for the blackboard. The lessons are selected with judgment, and those of the latter portion are a good deal more advanced than in the old reader; the adoption of the system of phonetic drill being intended to advance the pupils more rapidly than the superseded method of instruction. If the "First Reader" may be taken as an indication of the character of the entire series, it will be highly creditable to the department.—*Toronto News.*

We are pleased to read so flattering a review of the first of the new series of school books being prepared under the direct supervision of the Education Department. The lengthened experience of the compilers, in the practical work of the school room, has adapted them for the important and peculiar duty assigned them in this connection. It will no doubt be a pleasure and satisfaction to them to see that the ultimate result of their careful, painstaking and arduous labors are appreciated by a critical and fault-finding public.

Notes and Comments.

The Scott Act was defeated in Compton county, Que., last week, by a majority of 160.

The ice palace in Montreal this winter is to cost \$5,000. It will require 63,000 blocks of ice, or double the number employed in the last building. Its ground plan will be elliptical, 160 feet from east to west and 120 feet from north to south, with a main tower 100 feet, and high flanking towers 56 feet high.

There have been fifty-six contests held under the Scott Act, out of which the act has been victorious forty-six times. This is an unparalleled proportion of victories for any cause. The majorities given for the act in these contests aggregate 28,142. This is by many thousands the largest majority ever given any contested cause in Canada.

It will seem odd for people to go there evening meal at eighteen o'clock, and be down town after dark till twenty-two or twenty-three o'clock, but that is evidently what we are coming to. Standard railway time has been adopted all over the continent with little hesitation, and now the Meridian conference, which has been sitting at Washington, has recommended the twenty-four hour clock system. It is not unlikely that it will also be generally adopted, and it will without doubt be a great improvement when people get used to it.

Board of Education.

The Board of Trustees of Acton Public School met in Council Chamber on Monday evening, 1st Dec.

Members present, Mr. James Moore, chairman and Messrs. W. H. Lowry, W. P. Brown, and Thos. C. Moore.

Motions of last meeting read and confirmed.

The secretary reported that Miss M. A. Draper, Listowel, whose application for second department was accepted had failed to accept the situation. Miss Mary Henry London, also failed to accept. Miss Hattie Jelley of Mount Forest was then communicated with and accepted the situation. Miss Alice Baxter of Toronto telephoned acceptance of third department.

Report adopted.

Moved by W. P. Brown seconded by W. H. Lowry that Mr. Thomas T. Moore be re-engaged as teacher of first department at same salary as at present paid.—Carried.

Moved by W. H. Lowry, seconded by Thomas C. Moore, that the application of Miss Hattie Jelley, as teacher of second department, at a salary of \$300, be accepted.—Carried.

Moved by Thomas C. Moore, seconded by W. P. Brown that the Town Hall be the place for holding the election of trustees to fill vacancy caused by the retirement of Messrs. W. H. Storey and James Moore from the Board, and that H. P. Moore be and is hereby appointed Returning Officer with instructions to give proper notice thereof.—Carried.

Moved by Thos. C. Moore, seconded by W. P. Brown that the property committee be and is hereby instructed to confer with the owners of the Congregational Church, with a view to securing a portion of the building for use as a school room. Board then adjourned.
