

MUNICIPAL NOMINATIONS.

Mr. W. H. Storey again elected by acclamation.

Eight Candidates for the office of Councillors.

OUTSIDE NOMINATIONS.

The nomination of candidates for the offices of Reeve and Councillors for the village of Acton, for the ensuing year, took place at noon on Monday, with the following result:

For Reeve: Col. W. A. L. L. Nominated by Gabriel Wells, seconded by Wm. Masalas.

For Councillors: Joseph Fyfe, Nominated by C. S. Smith, seconded by W. P. Brown.

C. S. Smith, Nominated by Edward Nicklin, seconded by Luther Lyman.

John Kenney, Nominated by Wm. Masalas, seconded by Gabriel Wells.

William Ismond, Nominated by A. B. Wright, seconded by Col. Allan.

Donald Cameron, Nominated by Paul Jarvis, seconded by William Masalas.

James Moore, Nominated by Luther Lyman, seconded by Edward Nicklin.

J. B. Pearson, Nominated by A. B. Wright, seconded by Paul Jarvis.

D. Henderson, Nominated by George Garrett, seconded by Thomas Easton.

W. P. Brown, Nominated by D. Henderson, seconded by D. Maloney.

Col. Allan withdrew from the Reeve's contest and Mr. W. P. Brown from that of the Councillors.

At one o'clock the returning officer declared the time for receiving nominations closed.

The several members of the council of the past year were then called upon to address the meeting relative to their work and actions during the year just closed.

Mr. Storey reviewed the work of the year, touching upon the various matters which had come before the public during the year, in a very charitable and friendly manner.

He referred particularly to the cemetery question, showing that the council were only desirous of meeting the views of the ratepayers in the matter, and were still prepared to put into operation any feasible scheme which would command the support of the majority of those interested.

Mr. Henderson, as chairman of the Finance Committee, presented a detailed statement of the receipts and expenditures of the year, all of which has been from time to time published in the Free Press.

He dwelt upon the rate of taxation, and stated that at the beginning of the year the council had decided to keep the rate as low as possible.

The rate had been reduced from 19 to 17 mills, and had it not been that the chairman of the Street & Sidewalk Committee had exceeded his grant by \$304.73 the rate would no doubt have been brought down to 15 mills.

He had hoped for the success of the cemetery By-Law, feeling confident that if carried, the cemetery, under municipal control, would have assisted materially in reducing taxation.

Mr. Ismond, chairman of the Street and Sidewalk Committee, read a carefully prepared report, in which he accounted for every dollar of the \$400 grant, as well as the \$306.73 which had been paid out without official sanction.

He gave an exhaustive review of the various works performed by the committee, and to make his report as complete as possible gave the names of all the men employed during the season and the amounts paid to each.

Mr. Cameron corroborated the chairman's report.

All the newly-nominated candidates—except those who silently retired before their turn for being called upon had delivered short speeches expressing thanks for their nomination and promising if elected to work to the best of their endeavors for the advancement of the interests of the municipality, and at the same time have an eye single to the reduction of the rate of taxation.

The meeting then took an informal character with general conversation upon various subjects concerning the municipality, the Cemetery question being the principal topic.

The explanations made and the misrepresentations corrected concerning this matter had a very salutary effect, and upon narrowing the question down to the actual facts and intentions of the council, it was found that even those who had opposed the recent By-Law really held about the same opinions as the promoters of the scheme.

All present realized and admitted the great necessity for a cemetery, and we feel confident that a By-Law would now easily carry with remarkably few dissenting votes.
