ANOTHER BATTLE.

Col. Otter's Column Has an En gagement With Indians.

VICTORY SCORED.

Winnered, May 5,-A despatch from Saskatchewan Landing, via Swift Current per courier who arrived this evening from Battleford, brings news of another battle fought with Indians on Poundmaker's re serve on Sunday, May 3.

A flying column of 300 men, under Col. Otter, attacked the Indians, who were 600 strong at 5 o'clock in the morning. The fight lasted till noon.

Our loss was seven killed and 12 wound

The enemy lost 100 killed and wounded Col. Otter covered, including the engagement, 70 miles, fought the battle and returned inside of 30 hours.

The Northcote grounded several times and broke her capstain while trying to get off. The Saskatchewan has risen two feet and is still rising. This solves the supply difficulty.

By-Law No.---

A BY-LAW to raise by way of loan the sum of One Thousand Dollars, to pay the purchase money of land for a Public Cemetery, for the Village of Acton, and for the improvement of the same.

Whereas the Municipal Council of the Village of Acton have been petitioned to secure land for the purpose of a Public And whereas for the purpose of paying

the purchase money of said land, and im-

proving the same, it will be necessary for

the said Municipal Council to raise the sum of One Thousand Dollars. And whereas it will require the sum of Ninety-five Dollars to be raised annually by special rate on the whole rateable property of the Village of Acton for paying the said debt af . One Thousand Dollars as

hereinafter mentioned. And whereas the amount of the whole rateable property of the said Village of Acton, according to the last revised assessment roll of the said Village of Acton, is One Hundred and Eighty-seven Thousand, Two Hundred and Thirty-nine Dollars.

And whereas the amount of the debt the said Village of Acton is Five Thousand and Twenty Dollars, for principal and the sum of nil for interest. And whereas for paying the interest and

creating a yearly sinking fund for paying the said sum of One Thousand Dollars if will require an annual special rate of one seemed to have enough and retired for a The By-Law to settle the remuneration half of a mill in the dollar in addition to all rates to be levied in each year.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Village of Acton.

1st. That it shall be lawful for the Reeve of the said Village of Acton to raise by way of loan from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter mentioned, a sum of money not exceeding in the whole, the sum of One Thousand Dollars and to cause the same to be paid into the hands of th Treasurer of the said Village for the purposes and with the object above recited.

2nd. That it shall be lawful for the said Reeve to cause any number of Debentures to be made for such sums of money as may be required, not less than One Hundred Dollars each and not exceeding in the whole amount the said sum of One Thousand Dollars and that the said Debentures shall be sealed with the seal of the said Village of Acton and be signed by the said Reeve and countersigned by the Treasurer of the said Village. 3rd. That the said Debentures shall be

made payable in twenty years at furthest from the day hereinafter mentioned by this By-law to take effect at the office of the Treasurer of the said Municipality and shall have attached to them coupons for the payment of interest. 4th. That the said Debeutures shall bear

interest at and after the rate of six per cent. per annum from the date thereof which interest shall be payable annually on the First day of December in each year at the office of the said Treasurer of the Village of Acton.

5th. That for the purpose of forming a sinking fund for the payment of the said Debentures and the interest at the rate aforesaid to become due thereon a special rate of one half of a mill in the dollar shall in addition to all other rates be assessed, raised, levied and collected in each year upon all the rateable property in the said Village of Acton during the continuance of the said Debentures or any of them.

6th. That this By-law shall take effect and come into operation on the twentieth day of May, A. D. 1885.

And be it further enacted by the said BENNET-In Erin. on the 1st May, Mary Municipal Council that the votes of the electors of the said Village of Acton on the above By-law shall be taken between the hours of Nine o'clock in the forenoon and Five in the afternoon on Monday the Tuesday, 2nd June, 1884 eighteenth day of May A. D. 1885. at the Town Hall in the said Village of Acton, in Matthews' Hall in the said Village of Acton, and that John C. Hill, of the said Village of Actor in the County of Halton, shall be Deputy Returning Officer at the polling place at Matthews' Hall, and that J. E. McGarvin shall be Deputy Returning Officer at the polling place in the Town Hall in the said Village of Acton, and that the Clerk of the Council shall sum up the number of the votes given for and against the said By-law at the Hall in the said Village of Acton, on the same day at the hour of six o'clock after the polling of the

And further, that the time and place for the appointment of persons to attend at the various polling places on behalf of the res pective parties promoting and opposing said By-law, and at the said summing up of the votes by the Clerk shall be at the Council Chamber in said Village of Acton at eight o'clock p. m. of the Sixteently day of May, A. D. 1885.
