Quarterly Communion. The usual quarterly communion services in connection with Knox Church were held during the week. Rev. D. Strachan, Rockwood, preached on Friday, and Rev. Mr. Butherford of Fingal on Saturday and Sunday. The administration of the Lord's Supper to communicants took place on Sunday Morning.

No Camp This Year. It is said that owing to the great expense of the North West war, there will be no volunteer camp at Niagara this summer.
