

THE SUN'S BLIND PARTISANISM.

SUDDEN AND LAMENTED DEATH.

Dr. W. H. MacDonald, of Toronto, an old Acton Boy, died in his Prime.

BY SOME MYSTERIOUS CAUSE.

The news of the death of Dr. W. H. MacDonald, of Toronto, without any previous intimation of illness, last Thursday, came with a shock which cast a cloud of the darkest gloom over this community.

The Toronto papers say the death of Dr. MacDonald deprives the medical profession of one of its brightest and most energetic members. The Dr. was just entering the prime of manhood, being only thirty, and he had a most promising career before him.

The Dr's paternal home is near this place, and about ten or twelve years ago he came to Acton to reside, having been appointed teacher of Bannockburn school. He taught here for six or seven years with much success and to the unbounded satisfaction of the trustees.

Federal services were held in Toronto on Friday afternoon, after which the remains were brought to Acton for interment. The funeral on Saturday was very largely attended. The bearers were Dr. Lowry and Messrs. J. E. Moore, John Lawson, V. S. Hill, The floral tributes were abundant and of the choicest description.

A Scott Act election takes place in Peterboro county on September 24. The Canadian Pacific between Montreal and Winnipeg will be open within thirty days.
