Her majesty has approved the project of bestowing medals upon the Canadian sol diers who were engaged in the work of suppressing the Riel rebellion.

Canadian exhibitors have won three plomas, honor-highest honor; 18 gold medals, 31 silver, 33 bronze, and 80 honorable mentions, at the Antwerp Exhibition.

It is rumored that Mr. Jos. Hickson, general manager of the Grand Trunk, has been appointed to the London, Eng., Board of directors, and that Mr. John Bell, of Belleville, will take his place as manager.

It is worthy of note that in no county or city has the Scott Act ever been repealed; and in every case in which the 'Act has been defeated, and a second contest has taken place the Act has been carried upon the second vote. Public sentiment is growing everywhere in favor of the law.

Though the Scott Act has been adopted in Fredricton, N. B., on two different votes, another effort is to be made to secure its repeal. The opponents of the measure claim to have the promise of a majority aganinst the continuance of the Act. It is as well not to boast until the vote is taken.

It is generally thought that \$ the park on the Canadian side will be thrown open, free from road tolls and extortionate hackmen, on July 1st of next

An order in council has been passed by the Ontario government, authorizing the Provincial Board of Health to appoint inspectors with power to board all trains and steamboats coming westward from Montreal, and to compel all passengers to produce certificates of vaccination or be yaccinated on the spot. The importation of rags and second hand clothing from Montreal is strictly prohibited. All local boards of health are empowered to preceed with compulsory vaccination where cases of the disease may be reported.

AN IMMENSE FORTUNE.

Prospective Millions, in Which an Act Family Claims Legal Heirship.

Some time ago we referred to the fact that Dr. Richard Johnson and family, residents of Acton and vicinity, were claimants of a large estate in England, and that the Doctor was engaged in establish ing his claims to a proportion of the estate. We are pleased to state that the prospects for the family coming into possession of their share of the property at a no distant date are very encouraging, much more in fact than is the case in the majority of similar claims. The history of this estate -the celebrated Lawrence-Townley estate is as follows :--

The heirs of the Lawrence-Townley es tates in England, who have for 40 years been making spasmodic efforts to get possession of the vast property, are now combining together to make a general investigation and have the matter settled. The value of the estates is found to be much larger than was first supposed. It is now placed at the enormous sum of \$800,000,000 and even that is thought to be much below the actual value. The British Govern ment, which has held the estates for two centuries has, by Act of Parliament, passed on Aug. 4th, decided to pay over to all legal heirs their proper proportion of the moneys This has put the matter on a much better footing, and an effort is being made now to secure all information about the heirs, as required by the Act. There are a large number of the descendants of the original owners in Canada and the United States. In Toronto alone there are about 20 fam ilies who will have claims upon the estates. The enormous sum to be divided, how ever, will make ample provision for all claimants. The family have offices in London, Eng., and an agent in Toronto to collect information. One of the heirs will leave for England in a few weeks to compare notes with the agent there. Mr. Wm. Northcote Geare, of 475 King street, West, one of the heirs, is acting as agent, receiving correspondence and sending information to all members of the family who place themselves in communication with him. He will go to England in about six

weeks to help straighten up the matter. Hon. Henry S. Northcote, eldest son of the Earl of Iddesleigh, is now in Montreal, and will visit Toronto shortly to see what information has been obtained there. The estimates covers 40,000 acres of land in England. They are known as the Townley estates, in the counties of York and Lancashire, and the Vane Tempest estates, comprising extensive mining properties at Stella, Blayton, Ryton, Winlaiton and Stanley, in the counties of York, Lancashire and Durham. They are now in the hands of the Imperial Government, and managed by the Marquis of Londonderry. Elizabeth Townley, of Lancashire, Eng., married Sir Robert Lawrence in 1504, and she wa willed \$30,000,000, which sum was never paid over. Mary Townley married John Lawrence in 1693. The Vane Tempest estate came to the Townley family through the marriage of Sir Richard Townley to the heiress of Lord William Widdrington in 1665. The marriage of John Lawrence was against the will of his parents, owing to religious differences, and he came to America, living in Boston, New York, Halifax, N. S., and Walpole, Mass. He

DR. MACDONALD'S DEATH. Verdict "Deceased Came to His Death Through Some Cause Unknown."

The inquest on the body of the late Dr W. H. MacDonald of Toronto, formerly of Acton, was resumed on Monday evening, Coroner Johnson in the chair.

Dr. W. H. Ellis testified that he, as pub-

lic analyst had received the stomach and portion of the intestines of deceased from Dr. Sheard. He examined them for poisons and found none. Poisons which would produce the symptoms observed at the post mortem examination were narcotics, such as chloral, chloroform, prussic acid and morphine. He had made specia tests for these poisons, and afterwards general test for any poison whatsoever, but property, pay expenses and remove. after all these examinations had not found a trace of poison of any description. the contents of the stomach. The coroner then addressed the jury He said that the evidences, went to show that Dr. Macdonald did not die from juries inflicted by any person; that he die 125 00 not die from the effects of poison administered by himself or any one else, and that his death took place without any struggle. At time of his death Dr. Macdonald had in his room a quantity of an excessively deadly drug, atropeine and he was, known to possess one or two hypodermic syringes. The coroner could easily conceive that if Dr. Macdonald had this syringe in hi room he could have given himself too much of this drug, and it would be almost possible to detect the spot to which the syringe had been applied. But the doctors who made the post mortem examination had stated positively that there were no marks of the hypodermic syringe on the

> The jurymen were then left to themselves, and after being absent for a short time, brought in a verdict simply stating that the deceased had come to his death through some cause unknown to them.

The result of Prof. Ellis' analysis will disperse the fears of foul play entertained by some, and the evidence goes to prove almost conclusively that the deceased did not come to his death by an overdose of any anæsthetic, applied to obtain rest. The doctor's death is one of those raysterious occurrences which seem to be beyond the 15-1v. power of mortal man to solve.
