When the Cemetery Committee concluded last October to suspend operations in connection with the opening of the new cemetery-owing, as stated by them, to the persistent hostility of Messrs. Pearson and Ismond—they appealed to the electors to sustain them at the coming municipal elections if their course was approved of, and to give their decided expressions of disapdeemed it derogatory to their general intercsts; otherwise to leave the cemetery supporters at home. In response to this appeal, Mr. Storey, chairman of the Cemetery Committee, was returned Regre by acclamation, and at the election on Monday Messrs. Henderson, Fyfe. and Cameron, having adopted the following platform of very few available votes remained uncast at the close of the poll. the Cemetery Committee as their own, were elected as a full ticket. The platform, as published by themselves last week is as

1st. We pledge ourselves to support the whole of the Cemetery property now in the possession of the Corporation; and in any further expenditure to proceed no faster than the revenue deproviding sinking fund and interest on debenture 2nd. We further pledge ourselves to use no public funds, for fencing or other improvements or survey of said property, other than obtained from the sale of cemetery plots referred to; and to survey only such portions of the rear part as shall meet the requirements of the people's wants.

That they are and have been in favor of the course pursued by the Cemetery Comi-

That they desire that policy continued : That they favor the retention of the whole nineteen acres for cemetery purposes, so that every person desiring a plot may have his or her choice of site;

And that the "dog-in-the-manger! policy pursued by the opposition members last year was not in the interests of the public. By the defeat of Mr. Ismond we interpret that the people consider :-

That a paid commissioner of streets and sidewalks is an unnecessary and too expensive a luxury for a municipality of Acton's

The judgment is rather harsh on Mr. Ismond, and is, in fact, almost unjust, for, though he was the commissioner and received the pay, he was not entirely responsible for the creation of the office, and it seems unreasonable that he should be compelled to bear the whole of the censure for the unfortunate arrangement. We recommend that the new Council pursue the course of its twelve predecessors-excepting last year-and appoint the chairman of the committee on streets and sidewalks its commissioner, without pay.
