THE WARDEN'S ELECTION.

The report of the election of Warden for the County appears in another column, wherein it is shown that Mr. Baxter, of Burlington, was the caudidate elected. We must admit that we are disappointed at this result for we fully expect that Acton and her worthy representative would this year be honored, as they both deserved. As we stated last week, although Acton has been incorporated thirteen years and always supplied during that time a man of honor and ability at the County Council she has never had the pleasure of seeing her member occupy the chief chair. Burlington, on the other hand, incorporated in the same year as Acton, is now in possession of the Wardenship for the third time; and every other municipality in the county has also had a similar mark of distinction. This is considered an outrage on our municipality by the citizens; it is the very essente of unfairness and we can hardly blame them if they feel disposed to advise their representative in consequence to leave his chair vacant at the County Council board for the present year at last. Had Acton persisted in sending incompetent men to the courcil there might have been some excuse for the treatment received; but she has not. Her re presentatives have been recognized as men occupying no second place either in the council or in the community. The whole secret is that they have always happened to be more or less prominently identified

In examining the various ballots one would naturally come to the conclusion that there was considerable child's play about the election; but such was not the case. The repeated ballots, with the scat tered voting was the result of a series of cunning wire pulling and lobbying for political ends by one of the political parties, and also with a view by some members to en deavor if possible to cover up their promises voluntarily made. Thus is proved again that the exigencies of party politics compel men to dishonest actions, and in this case secured the election of a man whose personal claims did not deserve to be entertained and whose municipality could in no wise reasonably or honorably expect the office to be conferred on this occasion.

with the Conservative party.

Had Mr. Storey not relied upon the promises of certain Reform members who voluntarily offered to support him if he offered himself as a candidate he would never have entertained the idea of present ing himself for election. He looked upor these members as honest and sincere in their proffered support; some of them failed to fulfil their promises and his defeat was the inevitable result. In justice to Messrs Lindsay and Menzies it should be stated that they supported Acton's candidate throughout.

We are considerably surprised that one of the members of our own township coun cil, residing in proximity to Acton, and whose interests are identical with our own. should withhold his support from our representative, principally on political grounds. Of course, he violated no promises by his action, but we reasonably looked for Acton to receive his consideration and willing support.

Well, Mr. Storey has failed to receive the Wardenship, but after all he is better off from many points of view. He has lost the honor but will be saved much trouble, inconvenience and loss of time. which in the management of his extensive and continually increasing business are important considerations, and while will not occupy the desired office, he ha the satisfaction of knowing that he was the popular choice of the council.

THE SCOTT ACT.

It is rumored that the Ontario government is contemplating the establishment of a bureau, whose functions it shall be to assist in enforcing the law in those counties-which have adopted the Scott Act and that the charge of that bureau will be placed in the hands of a gentlemen in whom the friends of that Act will have every confidence. There is probability also, that officers will be appointed to enforce the law in each Scott Act county or group of counties for Scott Act purposes who will not be amenable to local influences. Upon these officers will be thrown the responsibility of detecting and punish ing offenders against the law. If these rumors are true, and they appear to have excellent foundation, such a step will meet with popular approval; because, however much public opinion may be divided as to the wisdom of adopting the Scott Act. these can be no division of opinion as to the fact that the public interests demand its enforcement, when once adopted. The obstacles thrown into the way of the friends of the Scott Act by the Dominion government, have made the former despair of obtaining courteous treatment much justice in that quarter; and now they urge Mr. Mowat to redeem the pledges he made twelve months ago, when he said that if the Dominiou government failed to do that which was right in the matter the Ontario government would consider the subject. It is not improbable that the Ontario government will introduce important legislation at the comingsession, both respecting the Crooks Act and the Scott Act .-- Ottawa Free Press.
