Many are the arguments used by those not in sympathy with the Act to support the contention that the Act has entirely failed to effect any of the objects for which it was passed, and in support of their assertions constant reference is made to the County of Halton as one in which the effects of the measure are the most noticeable in this direction. In contradiction to this statement, Rev. D. V.
