SCOTT ACT A SUCCESS.

Report of the Temperance Committee at the General Conference.

READY FOR PROHIBITION.

The report of the Temperance Committee was presented by Rev. D. L. Brothour on Monday evening. It alluded to the success of the Canada Temperance Act, which is now in force in 25 counties and 2 cities in Ontario, and over 60 counties in the Dominion.

In regard to the working of the Scott Act, the following are the words of the report: "It gives us great pleasure to recognize the fact that great good has resulted to the people in every place where the Scott Act has been adopted and enforced."

"We are unalterably opposed to the use of all intoxicating liquors, including wine and beer, and repudiate the principles, teachings and practices of the Association known as the Liberal Temperance Union, believing that the use of milder intoxicating beverages lead to the perpetuation of the license system, the drinking habit of the people, and opens the way by which our young men will be led into the path of the drunkard."

The Council met at 12 o'clock, noon, in accordance with adjournment.

Members present—Messrs. Buck, Dalton, Folan, Graham, Husband, Menzies, Scott, McCollom, McLeod, Robinson, Warren.

A communication was read from W. H. Storey, Esq., Reeve of Acton, stating that it would be impossible for him to be present at this session of the Council, also a letter from the County Treasurer informing the Council that the sum of \$3,000 would be required to meet the expenses of the county before funds from minor municipalities would be available.

Mr. McCollom moved, seconded by Mr. Scott, that the fourth report of the Standing Committee on Finance be adopted.

Yes—Buck, Dalton, Husband, McLeod, Menzies, Robinson, Scott, Warren—8. Nay—Folan, Graham, McCollom—3. Mr. McCollom moved, seconded by Mr. Warren, that J. R. Barber, Dr. W. J. Roe and Rev. W. J. Wallace be appointed trustees of the Georgetown High School.

Mr. Scott moved, seconded by Mr. McCollom, that the sum of \$385 be granted to help to complete the gravel road from Cumminsville to Milton across the first concession in Trafalgar, between lots 9 and 10, amounting being about one-third of the sum required.—Carried.

Mr. McCollom moved, seconded by Mr. Robinson, that a wood furnace for heating the Court room be procured and set up in some of the apartments below, the County Buildings Committee to purchase and superintend setting up of furnace.—Carried.

Mr. Folan moved, seconded by Mr. Scott, that when this Council adjourns it stand adjourned until the first Tuesday in Dec., at 10:30 a.m.—Carried.
