THE SECOND CASE or Vicining the Demetery By Law.

DECISION RESERVED.

The case against John Duff, Erin, for violation of By-law 145 was heard before

Reeve Storey last Friday. Defendant was charged with burying a corpse in the old cemetery on August 31st. John Duff was called and pleaded not guilty, and took exception to the Reeve sitting on the case; as an interested party of the corporation.

John Mitchellisworn-I reside in Guelph am an undertaker; know John Duff; re member him coming to see me in August last about burying his brother; he told me to bury the body in Acton; all expenses were charged to Mr. John Duff; the deceased died in Guelph of typhoid fever; took the corpse to the cometery behind the Presbyterian Church in Acton; Mr. John Duff was at the funeral and took part in the burial.

Wm. Smith, sworn-I dug the grave for Donald Duff's body beside the grave of John Duff's son in the old cemetery; I charged the digging of the grave to Mr. John Duff. John Duff, the defendant, then said-I admit ordering my brother to be buried the graveyard at Acton, as stated by the witnesses, and hold myself alone responsi-

ble for the act. The Magistrate then asked Mr. Duff if he had anything further to say in the case. Mr. Duff said he had heard from report

that the new cemetery was in dispute yet and was not aware that a by-law had been passed, closing the old one. He desired to bury his brother were his son was buried. to one told him it was unlawful, and therefore he did not know he was breaking the

Mr. Storey said he was pleased and im pressed with the honest and frank demeanor of Mr. Duff, and although it was a wellunderstood principle that violators of the law could not plead ignorance in justification, yet it was the Justice's duty to take cognizance of any mitigating circumstances connected therewith. It seemed strange to him, though, that persons officiating at the funeral should not have told Mr. Duff he was breaking the law. It was very far from the Council's desire to levy penalties: all they required was due respect for municipal authority.

It must be borne in mind that the Council, at the request of the citizens, had passed a by-law to purchase, a new cemetery, and that this by-law wastratified by a respectable majority. They then exercised the right they possessed to close the old cemetery in the interest of the public health. Since then the right of the municipality to what is known as the six acres has been disputed by a person having no regard or respect for the people's wishes. They had done all they could as a Council. They had treated every person with the utmost consideration, kindness and courtesy, and yet they were met by the most obstinate and unseemly opposition. It should be remembered, however, that this opposition, though directed against the Council personally, is likewise intended to frustrate the interests of every citizen who voted for the Cemetery By-law.
