**NOTES AND COMMENTS.**

February 22nd, the date of the Dominion Elections, is the anniversary of Washington's birthday.

Presidents may come and Presidents may go, but Canadian elections go on forever.—*American Ex.*

Protests have been filed against every member of the Manitoba Legislature except those returned by acclamation.

The next Dominion House of Commons will contain 215 members, four new representatives coming from the Northwest Territories.

It is reported that the Imperial Government has consented to send out gunboats next season to assist the Dominion cruisers in protecting our fisheries.

Rev. Dr. Burns, of the Wesleyan Ladies' College, Hamilton, will be one of the candidates in the reform interest for that city at the coming Dominion elections.

Mr. Young, Police Magistrate of this County, last week deposited \$200 more of Scott Act fines into the county treasury, making now \$600 that has been deposited within a few months.

It is stated that two hundred miles additional of the Hudson's Bay railway will be completed by next fall if the Manitoba Legislature make the provincial guarantee satisfactory to English capitalists.

Several municipalities have decided to petition the Minister of Education to amend regulations for High School entrance examinations so as to allow pupils in rural sections to be examined in their own schools.

Action has been entered to recover \$300 from the village of Acton, for the breaking of a child's leg by defective sidewalks.—*Beeton World.* This will be interesting news to Acton people. The authorities have heard nothing of such action yet. The World must have been up late some nights last week.

Mayor Howland, of Toronto, has received a communication from Colonel Mansell, of the Infantry School at Fredericton, N. B., informing him that as a result of his temperance work among the officers and men at that school last summer, a temperance lodge has been organized with a very respectable membership.

Mr. Beaty has been rejected again. On Monday the Halton Tories met at Milton and nominated Mr. David Henderson. It is well known that an effort was made to impose "The Boy" upon the constituency. But the Halton Tories could not be induced to swallow West Toronto's "leavings."

Although Mr. Beaty was spoken of throughout the County as a candidate, his name was not mentioned at the convention.

The outside world is observant, and recognizes merit in whatever locality it may be found. The Montreal *Journal of Commerce* pays this compliment to an esteemed citizen—"Mr. W. H. Storey, the well known glove manufacturer of Acton, returns from municipal affairs this year. In his long service as Reeve of the municipality he rendered the most important aid to the progress of the town: Acton will do well if she gets another Reeve like him."

A bill is to be introduced in the Illinois Legislature providing that, in a case of deliberate homicide, in which the slayer is the father, brother or husband of a woman who has been betrayed and the slayer is proved to have been her betrayer, action for murder on manslaughter shall not lie. Under such circumstances the offence of slaying is to be reduced to a misdemeanor, punishable only by a fine, without imprisonment. A similar enactment is pending before the Indian Legislature.

The Press Department of the W. O. T. U. is being pushed vigorously throughout the Province. The Superintendent, Miss Jennie Harrison, Georgetown, Ont., has issued an urgent circular to all the Unions urging them to form Press Committees, solicit space in all the local papers and keep it filled with crisp and effective reading. The Union realizes that a man cannot "talk back" to a paper, and hence the quiet, relentless influence is very great where the publication would but rasp.—*Chicita.*

**THE CANDIDATES.**

Mr. John WALDIE, the standard bearer chosen by the Reformers in this constituency, is a gentleman well and favorably known throughout the County of Halton. He has been a resident of the County from his boyhood, until a few months ago when he removed to Toronto in order to personally superintend his large interests there. He was for many years the partner in the business of Major Kerns, M. P. P., the present member for the Provincial Legislature, and by industry, perseverance and sound business capacity built up a business second to none in the County. Mr. Waldie was the promoter of the scheme for the incorporation of the village of Burlington, which was consummated in 1878. He was the first Reeve of the new municipality, and continued in office until 1879, when he was succeeded by Major Kerns, his partner. The Wardens' chair at the County Council was filled by Mr. Waldie for two successive terms, the years 1876 and 1876. Mr. Waldie has always been a strong Reformer, and ready to put his shoulder to the wheel in assisting to elect the candidate selected by the party of his choice. He has for years been a consistent temperance man, and was one of the first supporters of the Scott Act to come forward and assist in making it the law of the County. Mr. Waldie is an honorable man and a good citizen, and if elected will ably represent the good old County of Halton in the House of Commons.

Mr. DAVID HENDERSON, the unanimous nominee of the Conservative convention, is a native of the County of Halton, and in every respect a Halton man. Forty-five years ago the gentleman referred to was the brain boy in the home of John and Isabella Henderson, at their homestead in the new survey of the township of Nelson, near Milton, and the whole of the interesting time, omitting his college days, has been spent in active, honorable and successful life within our county's borders. In the year 1866 Mr. Henderson came prominently into public life, in connection with the office of Deputy Registrar, to which he was appointed. For seven years he continued in this position carefully and efficiently performing the duties of the office to the acceptability alike of the County officials over him and to the people generally with whom his position brought him into contact. Never was the office better filled. The constant attention paid to the peculiar details in connection with the registration of property instruments won for him the favor of all. In fact, instances are to this day rehearsed by property owners in the county, where, by his systematic examination into titles, cheerfully given, though not required in his list of duties, hundreds of dollars have been saved to them by the proper rectification of errors in titles. After resigning the office of Deputy Registrar, in 1873, Mr. Henderson, in partnership with his brother-in-law, Mr. D. D. Christie purchased the large mercantile business of the late Chas. Symon, Esq., here, and ever since Acton has been the scene of Mr. Henderson's business operations. By his superior ability, invariable courteous bearing, and honorable transactions he has prospered abundantly and is one of our most successful business men. For some years he has been the manager of Acton Banking Company, an institution enjoying universal confidence. Mr. Henderson was one of the movers in securing an act of incorporation for Acton, and for the ten years ending the first of January, was an active member of the Municipal Council. He was for some time a member of Milton Council, has been a member of the County Council and served upon important committees. As a citizen he is one of whom any municipality might feel proud; always identified with any movement tending to the advancement or prosperity of either his town or county. He enjoys universal respect and confidence. Mr. Henderson is an uncompromising supporter of the Conservative party, and through several campaigns has done yeoman service for the candidate seeking the suffrage of the constituents in that party's interests. We have never been acquainted with a politician who could in a quiet conversational style put forth his views in such a forcible and convincing manner. He is in our judgment, the strongest man in his party in Halton to-day. Mr. Henderson has been publicly known all his life as a temperance man. He was a worker in the old Dublin Act campaign and gave the Scott Act in the recent contest his unwavering support. If on the 22nd inst. he is awarded by the choice of the people, the right to append the coveted M. P. to his name, we confidently believe he will go to Parliament with the firm determination to act in a manner such as in his judgment would serve his country's interests best.

**TORONTO'S MAYOR.**

The *Clarion*, Spring Hill, N. S., thus joyfully recognizes the man and the Prohibitionist who is Toronto's fearless Chief Magistrate:—"Here is a man who can talk. Mayor Howland, of Toronto, against whom heaven and earth were moved in the election of a few weeks ago, is reported as his speech at nomination. We extract a passage on the liquor question. It is plain talk, and was responded to by 2,500 of a majority. Gentlemen politicians, it is a little flash of what is coming, as sure as fate! Give up your time-serving, your tippling, your sidings against good men and good reforms, or you will be booted so deep with contempt that the tramp of the angel cannot reach you."

**SCOTT ACT ASSOCIATION.**

The Convention of the Halton Temperance Workers, Last Week.

**NO SURRENDER.**

The Halton Scott Act Association met in Milton on Tuesday; the Rev. Mr. Cameron, President of the Association, in the chair. The delegates in attendance numbered over seventy. The report of the treasurer showed a small balance on hand. The Committee on Resolutions reported the following resolutions, which were adopted:

1. Expressing high appreciation of the valuable services rendered the cause of Temperance in Halton by W. H. Young, Police Magistrate; regarding the same attempts made to traduce his magisterial character, and assuring him of the confidence of the Alliance in his impartial administration of Justice.

2. Complimenting Mr. W. D. Brothers, the efficient Inspector upon the faithful and zealous discharge of his duties, in the face of great difficulties, and pledging him their continued confidence and support.

3. Recording the marked improvement which has taken place during the past year in the operation of the Act; that though the Act is defective in some particulars, particularly in enforcing measures, they find it capable of more ready enforcement than the Crock's Act, and inviting all good citizens to give the Scott Act their cordial support.

4. Strongly censuring the recent appointment of Mr. Menner and Dr. Casgrain to the Senate, on account of their well known hostility to the Scott Act.

5. Expressing our warm appreciation of the Ontario Government in appointing in the County of Halton a faithful and judicious Police Magistrate, and an efficient Inspector.

6. Agreeing to refuse support to any candidate for Parliament who will not exert his influence to secure the necessary amendments to the Scott Act that it may have a full and fair trial in the various counties which have adopted it.

7. To co-operate with Huron County Council in memorializing the Ontario Legislature to legislate for the appointment of salaried Police Magistrates in all Scott Act counties, independent of the action of the County Councils.

On motion of Rev. A. E. Russ, M. A., it was resolved:—"Whereas the Scott Act has been adopted in 60 of the counties and cities of the Dominion, with a growing majority of fifty thousand in its favor, showing that our country is in favor of more advanced legislation for the total suppression of the liquor traffic, we therefore believe that the steady growth of public sentiment renders it the duty of our Parliament to pass a general Prohibitionary Law."

A resolution proposing to bind the members of the association to vote for only such candidates as would pledge themselves to vote for the "immediate enactment" and enforcement of total Prohibition was defeated. The consensus of opinion was strongly in favor of perfecting and efficiently enforcing the Scott Act.

This report of the Committee on Ways and Means says:—"There is every reason to conclude that the operation of the Act will be without financial loss to the county this year, the money already received by the treasurer of the county nearly equalling the expenditure."

In the evening the church was well filled with an appreciative and sympathetic audience, to hear the addresses by the Rev. B. R. Koefler and Mr. F. S. Spence.

**COUNTY PARLIAMENT.**

The Substance of the Business Transacted at the First Session.

The following is a synopsis of the transactions of the County Council at its first meeting last week:—

Ninian Lindsay, Reeve of Esquimaux, elected to the office of Warden on first ballot. It took fifteen last year to elect Mr. Baxter.

The standing committees for the year were appointed as follows:—

FINANCE—McLeod, Wheelihan, Robinson, Richardson and Fyfe.

ROADS & BRIDGES—Graham, Wheelihan, Scott, Fyfe and Howland.

CORRECTION—McCallum, Robinson, Webster, Menzies and Buck.

PARTISANS—Buck, Wheelihan, Pettit, Fyfe and McCallum.

EDUCATION—Huband, McLeod, Menzies, Webster and Richardson.

Dr. Lusk and Henry Gray, Esq., were appointed to the board of examiners for the current year.

Mr. Henry Robinson, Reeve of Trafalgar, was elected director of the C. V. railway.

Messrs. Wm. McCraney and John R. Barber were appointed trustees for Oakville and Georgetown High Schools, respectively.

Halton Farmers' Institute was granted \$25; the 20th Lorne Rifles \$50, and the County Agricultural Society \$100.

Messrs. Duncan Dewar and Leclach Grant were appointed auditors, and will receive \$12 each for their services.

The printing committee were instructed to procure by tender for 500 copies of the minutes, by-laws, &c., and other necessary printing.

Council adjourned to meet on the first Wednesday in March.

**THE CONVENTIONS.**

The Politicians of this County Have at last Chosen Their Men.

The Reform Convention held at Milton last Friday was attended by delegates representing all sections of the county. When the time for making nominations had arrived a note was read by the President from Mr. W. McCraney, who for eight years faithfully represented this county—1874 to 1878 and from 1892 to the recent dissolution—requesting the convention not to nominate him on this occasion. Mr. McCraney's private business having grown to such dimensions that he is obliged to give to his whole personal attention. Several aspirants for the candidature were put forth, and Mr. John Waldie, of Burlington—yet some months a resident of Toronto—was clearly shown to be the convention's choice. Mr. Waldie was absent but has since accepted the nomination.

The convention of the Liberal Conservative Association of the County was held in Milton on Monday to nominate a candidate for the House of Commons. Mr. David Henderson, banker of our own town, was the unanimous choice of the convention. He made a most speech and accepted the nomination amid enthusiastic applause. The meeting was a very large one, representatives from all the wards being present.

**HALTON FARMERS' INSTITUTE.**

An excellent meeting of this Institute, which should show good results, was held at Burlington on Wednesday and Thursday last week. Mr. James Bradley, ex-President, in the absence of the president, took the chair. After stating that the object of the Institute was to educate the farmer by discussing farming interests, he called upon Mr. Fuller, of Oakville, who read his paper on "Butter-making and Dairying." In the interesting discussion that followed Messrs. Campbell, McCraway and Spruiger took part, and much valuable information was elicited.

Mr. Burnett read a paper, on pears, and answered the many questions put to him satisfactorily.

On the second day Prof. Mills spoke on "How to Make Farms Pay," and divided the same into departments, thus: 1st—The farmer who attends to stock-raising; 2nd—He who attends to his manure pile; 3rd—He who grows clover; 4th—He who attends to the cultivation of the soil.

After discussion, Mr. John Hobson read a paper on "How to Make Stock-raising Pay," which evoked animated discussion, in which such eminent gentlemen in this line as Messrs. Fothergill, Pettit, Ramsay and Campbell took part.

Mr. Shaw read a paper on "The Advantages of Soling." Messrs. Neil Campbell, Ramsay, Ireland, Blanchard, Fothergill, Fisher, Shaw and Beattie entered into the discussion that followed, and it was demonstrated that all were not of like opinion.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the Institute at Oakville on or about the 1st of March.

**THE LAWS OF LIBEL.**

A deputation appointed to represent the Canadian Press Association, waited upon Attorney-General Mowat at his office last Friday, to suggest certain amendments, which the Association considers necessary in its laws regarding libel.

Mr. W. Watt, the President of the Association, said that newspaper publishers generally considered that the Libel Law as it present existed, was somewhat antiquated in its character, and he scarcely wished to say that though it was somewhat narrow, yet the views of some of the Judges were still narrower. They did not seek to shift any fair responsibility in regard to publication, but they were subject to great injustice at the hands of irresponsible persons and blackmailers who brought suits against them, which, however groundless, put the newspaper publisher to the expense of paying costs. He submitted the amendments desired by the Association as follows:

1. That publishers be permitted to demand security for costs in cases of libel.

2. That presumptive evidence of malice on the part of the publisher shall be shown by the plaintiff before he can become entitled to damages.

3. In cases where inaccurate statements have been published, and the publisher subsequently becomes aware of the inaccuracy that a correction, published as fully as the original statement, be deemed a bar to any action for libel.

4. That all actions for libel shall be tried at the place where the case first arose, or in the Province where the alleged libel has been first published.

The members of the deputation expressed their views upon the subject and Mr. Mowat said he would carefully consider the matter, admitting that there was a good deal of force in some of the views expressed.

Ottawa, Jan. 27.—A partial reconstruction of the Cabinet of the Dominion Parliament has taken place, caused by the retirement of Sir Alexander Campbell, and the re-entry of Sir Charles Tupper into public life. Sir Alexander Campbell has been succeeded as Postmaster-General by Hon. A. W. McLean, and Sir Charles Tupper was today sworn in as Finance Minister. Sir Charles and Hon. McLean left for Nova Scotia this afternoon, and will open the campaign at once.
