Railway construction is progressing at a rapid rate in India. Last year 1025 miles of new road were built ; this makes a total mileage of 13,390. There are 3200 miles more under construction, or authorized to be built. These roads pay moderately well. as those already in operation yield a return on the capital invested of 5.9 per cent. per annum. The progress of the railroad development in India is of interest to Canadians, in so far as upon it depends in a great measure the wheat-growing capacity of the country. The official estimate of the crop of wheat grown in India was last year 236,000,000 bushels. This appears to have been a short crop, for the average for a series of years has been calculated to be 266,000,000 bushels. The average yield per acre is small, being but nine bushels to the acre, Star.

ANTENSE DROUGHT IN THE WESTERN

CHICAGO, Aug. 8 .- A local paper rays there is an area of perhaps 75,000 miles in the North-west where the dust lies heavilupon the earth. The district is bounded by Madison on the North, Bloomington or the south, Lake Michigan on the east and the Mississippi River on the west. It within the limits of these boundaries that vecetation has lost its normal color and the earth its moisture. Leaves are falling from the trees, the grass in the meadows has grown yellow and white, and the streams are as dry as power horns. It has been nearly ten weeks since a soaking rain fell in this district. The big bull thistle-the pest of nearly every farm-has at last succumed to the fate of all vegetation. In Southern Wisconsin there are thousands of acres where corn will not yield a peck to the acre. The crop has been scorched and almost totally destroyed.

STANLEY HEARD FROM AGAIN.

Loxpox, Aug. 7 .- Further advices from Henry M. Stanley say that on June 6th the expedition reached a point half way between Yambi and Yambunga, the latter being the farthest point on the Aruwhimi reached by Stanley in 1873. Navigation was difficult and slow because the boats were carrying all necessary supplies for Emin Bay in ad dition to the supplies of the expedition. Stanley chose the Aruwhimi route because he learned that by the former he would have better resources and because the natives were friendlier... He hoped that his steamers would be able to ascend the rapids above Yambunga, beyond which the river is easily navigable. Stauley expected to

reach Wadelai about the beginning of August. 
